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New Jazz Album "Cools" Pop Music

A man called Robert Allen has had his share of luck in penning popular songs. A few of his more familiar tunes have been "It's Not For Me To Say," "A Very Special Love" and "Chances Are." Many of his songs were on the hit parade in the recent past, sung by people like Doris Day and Johnny Mathis.

Now 12 of his songs have been recorded by trumpeter-arranger Shorty Rogers in an album called "Chances Are It Swings." This is the first time as far as I can remember that a group of hit songs has been arranged for and played by a jazz band.

Of course, the hit parade is a rather restrictive thing. For a piece of music to appear on the top ten chart, it must be pretty basic or simple. If it isn't, it isn't remembered by people who listen to and buy popular records. If it isn't remembered, it isn't a hit. Generally speaking this is true, although occasionally a good song makes it. Because of the simplicity of the popular song, jazz musicians, who swing, from it just because there isn't much to work with.

Some jazz fans would rather hear improvisations on music that they know than hear originals. This is a good point when considered, because it's easier to realize the value of an arrangement or its execution by a musician if you already know what it is based on.

Shorty Rogers, one of the busiest musicians on the West Coast, writes, arranges both popular and jazz music, scores music for motion pictures and TV, and still has time to do an album like "Chances Are - It Swings." This is a good album - good tunes and bright, happy arrangements.

There is no personnel listing on the LP except for Shorty, because all the music is under contract to other labels, but it's pretty easy to tell who plays what. It's on the Victor label and should be of interest to the collector who likes his music race and well done.

Two more albums issued in the past couple of weeks utilize the talents of two jazz artists, although whether or not the albums could be called jazz LPs might be a matter for discussion.

Sarah Vaughn has a Mercury album called "Vaughn and Violins" with the orchestra conducted and music arranged by Quincy Jones. The selections of tunes is remarkable.

WHAT COUNCIL DID Committee Appointed To Investigate Civil Defence Programme

Reeve Sargent and Councilors Harrison, Gunn and Currie were named a committee by Mayor Jack Armstrong on Monday night to study how Georgetown groups could be coordinated into an effective civil defence organization. The action followed a letter from Ontario Minister of Planning and Development Hon. William M. Nickle who pointed out that the Federal Government were now paying 75 per cent and the Ontario Government 15 per cent of civil defence project costs. "In this day and age nothing is beyond the realm of possibility. We should have something in readiness. Certainly an organization should be set up," the mayor said. The committee will invite the county coordinator and the town's coordinator, whose resignation has never been accepted, to attend a meeting of interested groups.
