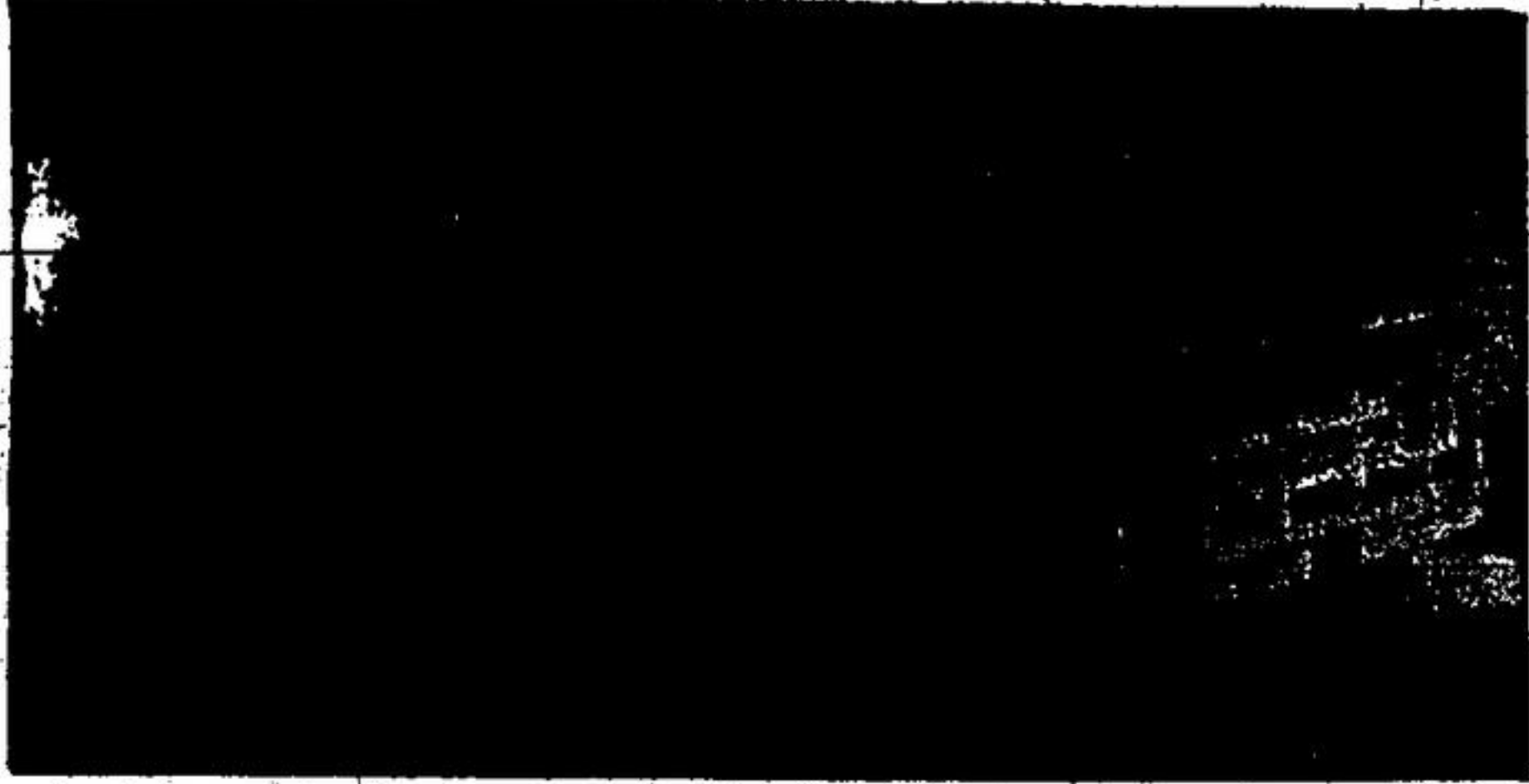


## 1960 CHEVROLET MEDIUM-DUTY STAKE

## Poppy Day in Georgetown Saturday, November 7th

Once again with the falling of the leaves and end of the beautiful autumn season, thoughts no doubt will be turning to that day set aside in Canada, and indeed in the Commonwealth, to remember those who sacrificed themselves in two great wars and in Korea. ### Halton Federation of Agriculture Awards Scholarships

Miss Marion L. Biggar, of Oakville R R 1, and Mr. Donald Taylor, Appelly Line, Burlington, have been awarded scholarships by the Halton Federation of Agriculture. An announcement was made by Mr. Mac Sprowl, president of the Halton county Federation of Agriculture. Each scholarship is for \$100, to be used by the winner during a First Degree Course in Agricultural Science or Homemaking Science.

In selecting the scholarship winners, consideration was given to academic standing, extra-curricular activities, 4-H and Junior Farmer activity, and participation in community activity. Miss Marion Biggar is attending the First Year Degree Course at Macdonald Institute, Guelph, and Donald Taylor, is attending the First Year Degree course at the Ontario Agricultural College. The Halton Federation of Agriculture scholarships are awarded annually, to encourage and assist rural students in Halton to take further studies in degree courses in Agriculture.
