Courses will consist of 14 two-hour lessons which will be given on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. Classes will begin on Oct. 20 and 21 at 8 p.m. and will be held each following week until Dec. 8 and 9. They will recommence Jan. 5 and 6 and continue until Feb. 9 and 10.

The basic fee for each course is \$5.00. \$2.00 must be forwarded with the application form and the balance paid at the first lesson attended. Students who wish to take two courses will send two application forms, one for each, and will forward a total of \$4.00.

- \* Amateur Theatricals (Tues.) Additional fee may be required.
- \* Square Dancing (Tues.) Total fee \$15 per couple; \$10 single.
- \* Welding (Tues.) Total fee \$15.
- \* Ballroom Dancing (Thurs.) Total fee \$15 per couple; \$10 single.

If an applicant is unable to attend a class for which he has registered, his initial fee of \$2.00 will be refunded if he notifies the Application Secretary before October 16th.

In all instances students will pay for costs of materials, and the necessary tools.

Applicants must be 16 years of age or over. Day school pupils will be accepted only on recommendation of Principal J. L. Lambert.
