The building's wooden construction contravenes the building by-law as it is located in a fire area. Mr. Cordaro claimed he had told the building inspector of his construction plans, and the inspector said he had understood aluminum would be used.

Mr. Cordaro also asked permission to build a wooden washroom behind the former bake shop and asked the town to take action to overcome poor drainage which funnels rain water into his building.

Road chairman Walter Gray said that the town has not taken over roads in this area, but that efforts will be made to keep the catch basins free.

Fifteen members of the Acton 4-H Forage Club completed their projects on Monday, September 14th, at the Lorne School.

In the Forage Club programme the members seeded and kept records on a one acre plot of a hay pasture mixture. The project is designed to promote hay and pasture management coupled with the use of improved forage varieties.

First year members exhibited eighteen pounds of grain taken from the club plot, and a collection of mounted legumes and grass plants. The second year members exhibited a bale of hay taken from the club plot, and a collection of legumes and grass seeds.

During the year regular club meetings have been held, with in-

struction on various management practices. The programme is under the direction of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture and local leaders Nino Braida, Calvin Aitken, and Eyle Somerville. The Acton Agricultural Society acts as a local sponsor. The club programme is scored out of 1,000 points, and the Club standing is as follows:
