### Open Deer Season Neighbour Counties

Southwestern Ontario hunters will be pleased to learn of the announcement by the Hon. J. W. Spooner, Minister of Lands and Forests, that there will be an open season for deer in the Counties of Brant, Huron, Oxford, Waterloo and Wellington. There is no open season in Halton.

It will be a three day season coinciding with the opening three days of the Parry Sound and Bruce-Grey seasons, November 9-11. Shot guns and bows and arrows only are allowed, and it is not permitted to use dogs.

The Department asks that hunters request permission to hunt on the farmlands and treat their host's property with respect.

"Possibly the landowner would appreciate a roast of venison if it is not too inconvenient to give it to him," said District Forester E. K. E. Dreyer. "Build up a good hunter - landowner relation and you increase your chances of having an open season next year."

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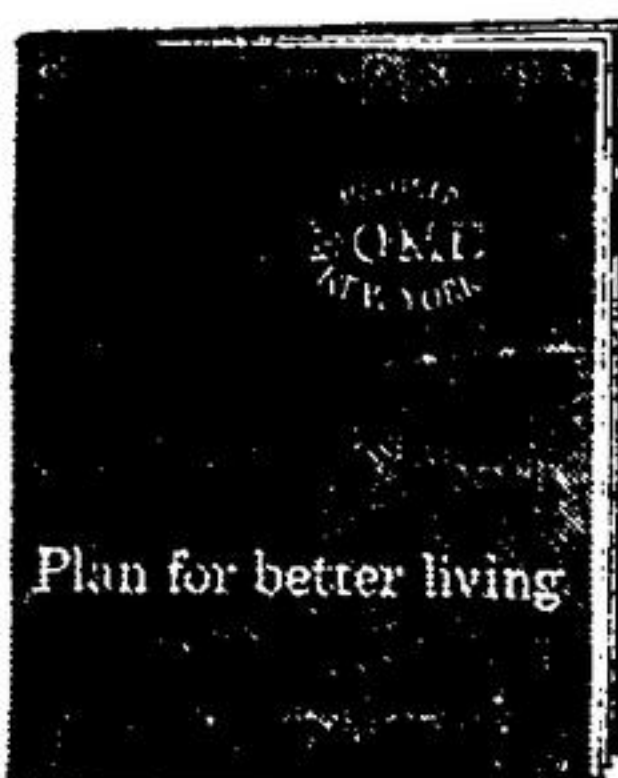
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
