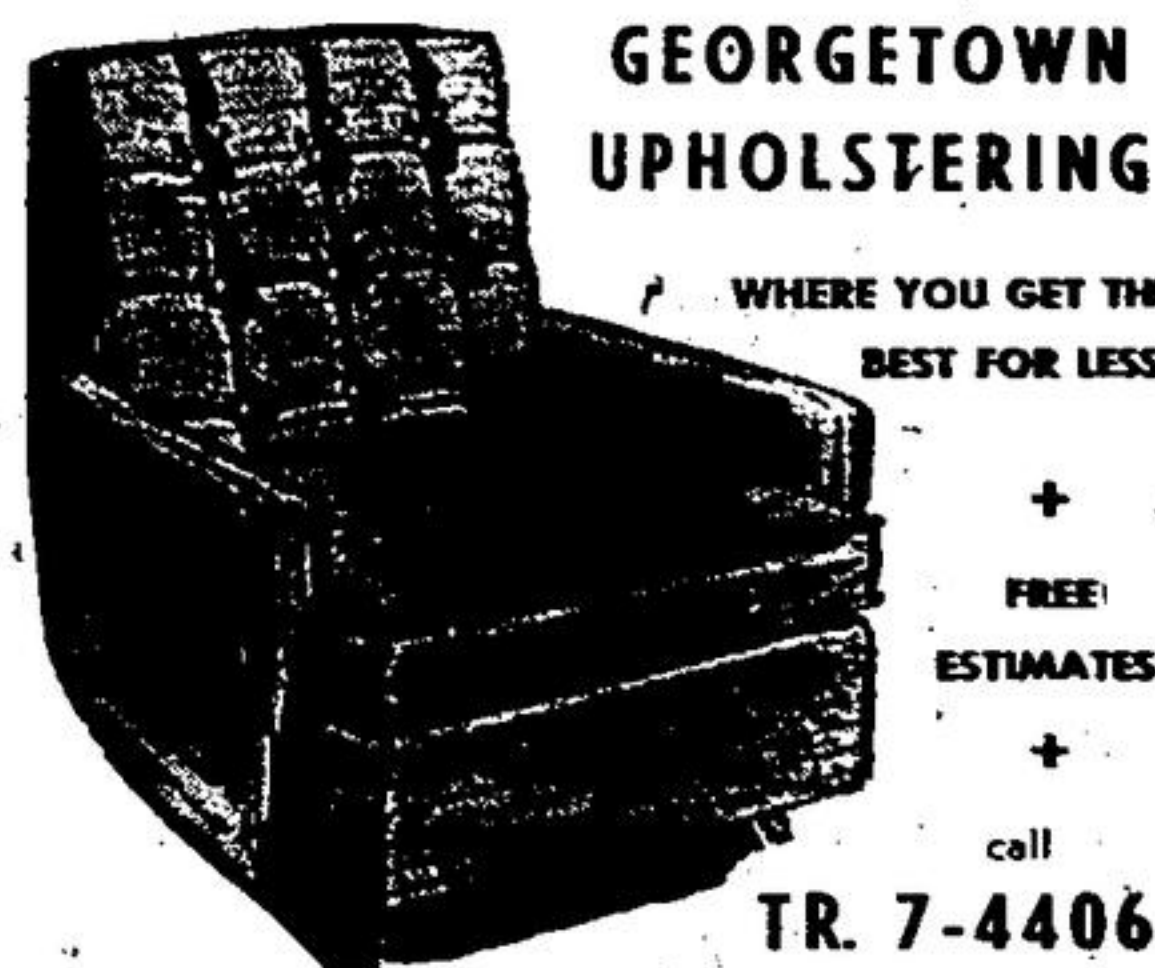

Good Budget, Paid Manager Tips for Chamber Success

"What's wrong with Georgetown, I can't see any place better suited for industrial and retail expansion. You have an ideal location, nice people, a labor pool, water supply. But you seem to lack the desire," was the provocative introduction to a speech by Stephen Jones, secretary manager of the Kitchener Chamber of Commerce at the quarterly meeting of Georgetown Chamber last Wednesday.

Mr. Jones, whose son Jim is associated locally with Harold McClure as a funeral director, gave chamber members many tips on operation of an alert group. He stressed that money must be spent, suggesting a \$12,000 budget for a town this size and a part-time paid manager. He cited the case of his own community which, with no particular tourist attractions, persuades thousands of conventioners yearly to come to town.

"Contribution of a Chamber of Commerce to a town's prosperity is a professional job," he said "and there must be organization, equipment and hard work to put it across."

The Kitchener group numbers some 800 members and estimates 76 percent of the city's development can be traced to

C of C recommendations to council.

"Letters to our local paper constantly say, 'Why doesn't the Chamber of Commerce do something about it? Does this happen in Georgetown too?' he asked.

He suggested that for ultimate success locally the Chamber of Commerce needs more members, more team play and a large budget.

Introduced by Harold McClure, Mr. Jones was thanked by Rev. Alex Calder for his talk.

The dinner meeting at North Halton Golf Club was chaired by Chamber president Jack Chilton. Decision was made at the meeting to continue the household Christmas lighting competition this year and to enter a float in the Christmas parade which will have a Disneyland theme this year. A donation was made to the Poppy Fund. Reports of secretary and treasurer were made by Les Percival and Leigh King.

A decision was made to move the present highway advertising sign to the west approach to town and to install a new sign at the east end which will be larger and feature industrial locations. Sketches of the sign were shown at the meeting.
