Halton Is Represented At Winter Fair Judging

The most demanding livestock judging competition for Junior Farmers, is the Inter-County Livestock Judging competition at the Royal Winter Fair. This year's competition is being held on Thursday, November 12th. Halton team members include: Sandy Hepburn, Campbellville, Jack Robertson, Georgetown, and Terry Hender, shot, Milton.

Teams of three, representing counties in Ontario, will compete in the Royal Winter Fair judging competition. Each contestant will judge and give reasons on 3 classes of Beef cattle; 3 of Dairy; 3 of Swine; including one Carcass class; and one of Sheep.

The winning team will be presided with the Jeffrey Bull trophy. In addition there will be trophies awarded for the top teams in Beef Judging, Dairy Judging and Swine Judging.

Among the individually contested awards there is the F. K. Morrow scholarship. This scholarship assists the winner to attend a two year course in agriculture at the Ontario Agricultural College, Western Ontario Agricultural School, or Kemptville Agricultural School.

Local Rotarians Mark Foundation Week

Georgetown Rotarians will join with nearly half a million Rotarians in 14 countries next week for a special observance of "Rotary Foundation Week". It was announced today by C. G. "Bud" Bishop president of the local club.

Rotary Foundation seeks to promote understanding and friendly relations between the people of different nations. Its major activity is granting Rotary Foundation Fellowships for International Understanding to outstanding graduate students for one year of study abroad as Rotary ambassador of good will.

Since this program was established in 1947, as a memorial to Paul P. Harris, the founder of Rotary, 1,199 young men and women from 87 countries have received Rotary Foundation Fellowships for study in 44 countries, with grants averaging over \$2500. Total grants by the Rotary Foundation for this activity now exceed \$3 million.

Rotary Fellowships are unique in that, with more than 10,300 Rotary Clubs throughout the world, the student is in direct contact with Rotarians and their families wherever he is studying. He attends their Rotary club meetings, visits in their homes and places of business, and travels as much as possible during his school holidays. In this way, he sees how the people in his host country live and he lays the foundation for increased international understanding which is one of Rotary's principal objectives.

Local Rotarians will highlight their observance of "The Rotary Foundation Week" at their meeting on November 16th at the North Halton Golf & Country Club with a presentation of "The Great Adventure" a film featuring the Rotary Foundation.
