Light Bulbs Ignite

Fire at Alliance Mill

Light bulbs being used to protect two large treatment tanks in the uncompleted wing at the Alliance Iron Smelting plant their purpose Monday night ignited a heavy thickness of insulation. The tanks were damaged by the fire and hot steam within a few minutes and a section of concrete parking wall was charred in the ensuing blaze.

The plant is a 4' receptacle in the boiler room of the new section and will be fitted for a water softening process in conjunction with the new boiler. Rubber liners inside the tanks, at first heated damaged by the heat, were removed.

The blaze was turned in at about 3:15 p.m.

The board took another look at the problem when a concerned parent took issue with the practice of keeping the school doors closed on rainy mornings until the regular opening times - a few minutes before the first bell.

Starting and stopping times at some of the schools and the board agreed a uniform time schedule and a policy that would have the doors opened earlier during inclement weather. The board favoured 8:30 a.m. as opposed to the principal's suggestion of 8:45. Decision was reserved until another meeting.

Barrow public school principal Harold Bony told the board that local artist Frank King has been commissioned by his school to do a painting at the cost of \$200. The \$200 will be paid for by the school through their annual Opera.

The project has had incremental value since some of the classes have been allowed to observe the painting take shape while Mr. King comments on the various steps.

A student which could prove disastrous was discovered last week when three classes in two public schools failed to respond to surprise fire drills because they did not hear the warning.

Two of the three schools in which all the classes were alerted are equipped with Classroom bells instead of the regular bell and the board agreed to look into installing this type warning system in the other three schools.

A trophy has been donated by the Georgetown Lions Club to the board for presentation to the pupil assuming the highest total points for his school at the annual inter school field day. Lucie Coffell and Pat Hyde of Chapel Street and Allan Whitson of Wrigglesworth tied for the trophy this year.

A \$15 a month increase in salary was voted attendance officer Harold Meyer. Mr. Meyer took on additional duties with the opening of George Kennedy public school.
