Diocesan Union President Tells of Winnipeg Conference

The November session of the Holy Name Society of Holy Cross Parish proved to be both fruitful and interesting. Activities towards the construction of an ice skating rink on the Holy Cross school grounds were initiated. Mr. Fitzmaurice, the principal, agreeing that the rink would be welcomed by the children, made numerous suggestions as to the model of construction. Mr. J. Boyle and Mr. W. Moody are looking into the details.

Rev. Fr. T. Van Lier, pastor of Holy Cross Parish, suggested improvement of the approach to the church entrance from the parking lot. The matter was discussed briefly and it was agreed that necessary details and renovations would be made later this year.

As an unexpected surprise Mr. Emile Demers, chairman of the Regional Directors of the Diocesan Union, made an appearance and discussed some of the work carried out in the 16 regions of the diocese under the regional directors. He pointed out that Mr. Bordignon of Guelph is the director in this region, and that a list of officers elected at the last convention would be available within 2 weeks. Mr. Demers explained that the function of the directors is primarily to advise and guide the individual societies. For additional information concerning the society he suggested reference to the Canadian Headquarters at Port Credit.

Following a reminder that Mr. J. Curtin, president of the Diocesan Union, and Mr. Fitzmaurice, principal of Holy Cross School, would be guest speakers at the next two monthly meetings respectively, Mr. A. Norris graciously introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Mr. Russell C. O'Neal.

Mr. O'Neal, past president of the Diocesan Union, gave an interesting and enlightening report on the Christian Social Life Conference held in Winnipeg last year. He and Reverend Father Harrigan, Spiritual Director of the Union were the Diocesan representatives, with the result that a first hand presentation of the spirit and procedure of the conference was given.

The theme of the conference was Christian Leadership. In order to adequately explore the subject careful plans were made. The participants were organized into groups of 10, including a specially trained chairman who introduced topics and directed the course of discussion. People from all walks of life were represented and exchanged their views and ideas freely. Topics covering almost every field of human endeavor were discussed. Mr. O'Neal cited, as an example of Christian Leadership in sports, the proposed skating rink as a typical particular aspect of leadership. He pointed out that Christian Leadership even in trivial matters is important. However he stressed that the Holy Name Society is in a position where it can do positive good and should go deeper and become involved in meatier projects.

The spirit of the conference was one of fellowship. Personal station in life was but an incidental. The interests of Bishops, priests and laymen alike were keyed to the subject of the conference — Christian Leadership. The result of this creative effort was an assembly of practical applications suiting the needs of all Christians. These details which were but touched on, owing to their

multiplicity, have been presented in a digest which may be obtained through the Parish Holy Name Society.

A refreshing lunch was served giving ample opportunity for the members to discuss the high points of the meeting.
