The last member of a family of twelve, Walter Robinson, of 14 Victoria Ave. died on Friday, November 6th at St. Peter's Infirmary in Hamilton. He was in his 84th year.

Born in Maids Newburn, in England, the son of Robert Robinson and Elizabeth Mounsey, he came to Canada at the age of 16 with two older brothers and at first lived at Palermo. Some four years later the three brothers started a farm near Tansley which they operated for some time before going into the fruit farming business near Aldershot.

In 1902, at Tansley, he married Laura Scott, of Georgetown and for three years served overseas with the 86th Machine Gun Battalion. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson moved here 19 years ago and marked their 57th wedding anniversary in January. He was a former member of the Canadian Order of Foresters and attended the Methodist church.

He is survived by his wife, a son, Thomas L. Robinson, of Sarnia, daughter Marian (Mrs. Earl Souter) of Hamilton, three grandchildren and four great grandchildren. The funeral service was held in the Dodsworth and Brown Funeral Chapel, in Hamilton, and interment was in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.
