PURPOSE: This amendment is to change the land use designation of cer-

(1) Agricultural to Residential.

(2) Agricultural to Commercial. (3) Agricultural to Recreation and Open Space.

(4) Agricultural to Industrial. (5) Industrial to Residential.

(6) Residential to Commercial. LOCATION:
