AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO THE OFFICIAL PLAN OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN

PURPOSE:
 This amendment is to change the land use designation of certain lands from:

ITEM
 (1) Agricultural to Residential.
 (2) Agricultural to Commercial.
 (3) Agricultural to Recreation and Open Space.
 (4) Agricultural to Industrial.
 (5) Industrial to Residential.
 (6) Residential to Commercial.

LOCATION:
 This Amendment consists of Six Parts which shall be known as Items 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 and 6.

Item No. 1, 2 & 3:
 are concerned with those lands in the East halves of Lots 19 and 20 in Concession 8 in the Township of Esquising and now in the Township of Georgetown lying North of the lands of the Canadian National Railways.

Item No. 4:
 is concerned with those lands in the East Halves of Lots 19 and 20 in Concession 8 in the Township of Esquising now in the Township of Georgetown lying South and West of the lands of the Canadian National Railway and bounded on the South west by the South-west boundary of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Georgetown.

Item No. 5:
 is concerned with those lands in Registered Plan Number 37 lying North of King Street, West of Emery Street and South of the lands of the Canadian National Railways in the Township of Georgetown and being more particularly described as Lots 1 to 10 inclusive on the North Side of King Street and Lots 34 and 35 together with an unnumbered Parcel between said Lots 34 and 35 and the lands of the Canadian National Railways all as shown on said Registered Plan Number 37.

 known as Mrs. Frances Wilson property, South West corner of Maple Avenue East and Guelph Street.

I MUST CONFESS I felt like a bit of a traitor to the beauties of our Canadian fall countryside when we planned to take a trip down thru the mountains of Vermont and New Hampshire to Boston, and thence to New York City for a few days.
