By-Law No. 59-41

TOWN OF GEORGETOWN
A By-law to provide for the submitting of a question to the Electors of the Town of Georgetown at the next ensuing annual election.

Whereas the Municipal Council may by by-law provide that the term of office of members of the Council shall be two years;

And Whereas the Municipal Council has deemed it advisable to obtain the opinion of the Electors according to the last revised voters' list at the next ensuing annual election on the question of a two year term of office for members of the Municipal Council;

Now, therefore, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown enacts as follows:

1. That a vote of the Electors qualified to vote according to the last revised voters' list of the Town of Georgetown shall be taken at the same time and at the same place as the next ensuing municipal election for the members of the Municipal Council and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold elections shall take the vote on the following question: "Are you in favour of the term of office of members of the Municipal Council being extended to two years?"

2. On the 7th day of December, 1959, at the hour of 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon the Mayor or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution shall attend at the Municipal Chambers for the purpose of appointing and, if requested to do so, shall appoint by writing, signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the affirmative on the question and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the negative on the question.

3. On the 7th day of December, 1959, at the hour of 7 o'clock in the afternoon at the Municipal Chamber in the Town of Georgetown, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes in the affirmative on the question and in the negative on the question. By-law read a first, second, and third time and finally passed this 5th day of October, 1959.

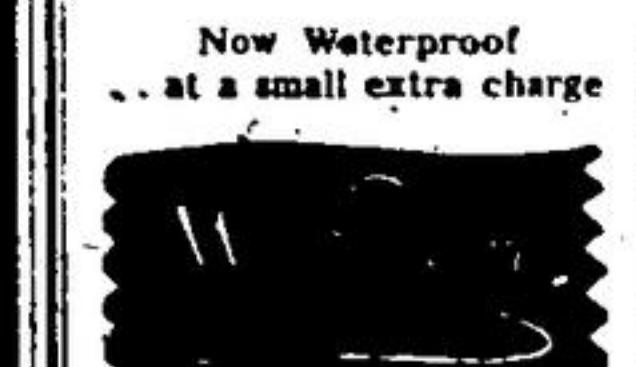
