A public school teacher here for 28 years until her retirement in June of 1953, Miss Beatrice Hume, officially opened Park Public School in a ribbon cutting ceremony last Thursday evening.

The centre of controversy for many months Park School opened its doors to district pupils on Nov. 8th, 1958, following a rain of protest from delegations seeking reason for a delay of more than two months. An outstanding record in both showing and judging was scored at the Royal Winter Fair by Cozy E. Herrington, Ballinacree, Ont. Mr. Herrington, internationally known in both departments of the poultry world, and editor of a monthly newspaper, Feather Fancier, completed his fourteenth consecutive stint as a judge. This year he awarded ribbons in the Asiatic, Australorp, Andalusian and Campine classes.

Showing 70 standard and 16 bantam birds in other classes in the poultry show, he amassed an impressive list of wins for his Sunset Farm entries.
