The Halton County Grade five pupils were honoured by the Halton County Mutual Fire Prevention Bureau at a banquet at the Milton Fire Hall Tuesday, November 24.

Susan Poppelwell of Oakwood Public School, Oakville, and John Gates of S.S. No. 3, Nassagaweya Township, were honoured as the 1959 first prize winners in the County Fire Prevention Poster Contest.

The contest was sponsored by the County Mutual Fire Aid Services, and is open to all County Grade five pupils.

Acton Fire Chief Jack Newton was appointed chairman of a committee to compile rules and regulations for a Halton County News Trophy Contest open to all papers in the county. A trophy will be awarded to the paper giving the best coverage to fire prevention news.

More than 20,000 tags outlining fire safety rules for the Christmas season have been purchased by the Bureau. The tags will be distributed throughout Halton County to groups selling Christmas trees for distribution with each sale.

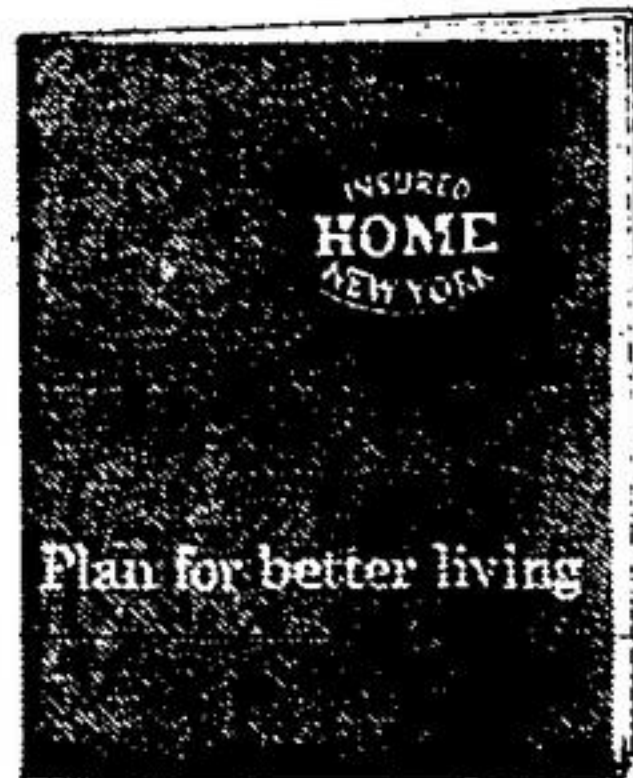

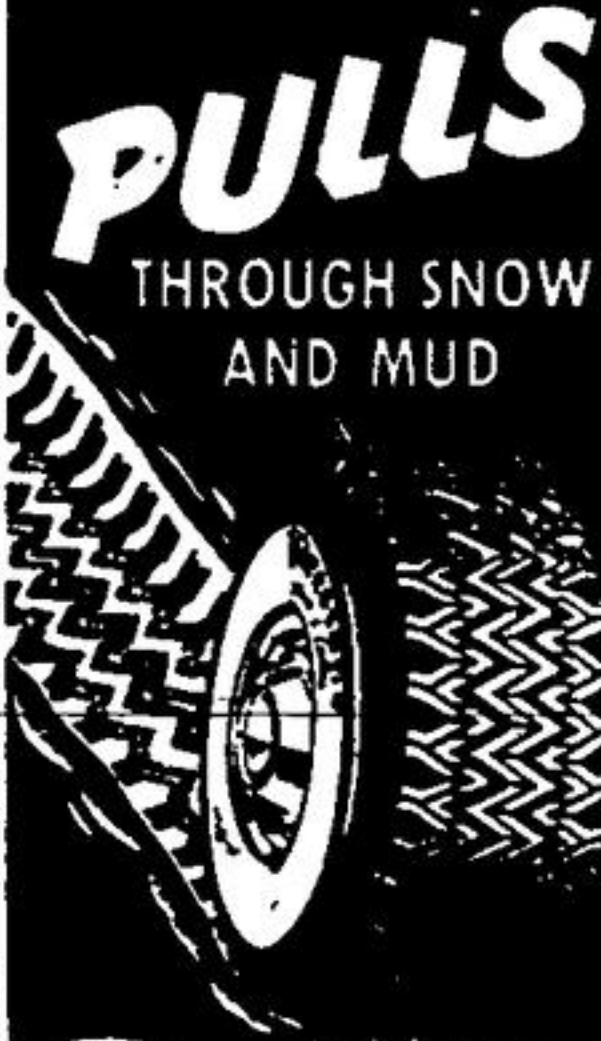
