### Young People Study Protestant Faiths

During the season 1958-1960 the Presbyterian Young People's Society of Norval and Union Churches is receiving from time to time addresses on the major denominations of Protestantism. The first in the series was given on Presbyterianism in October when the Rev. G. L. Royal stressed the ascending nature of the Church courts from Kirk Session to General Assembly, the history and Biblical reference to "elders" and "presbyters," and the particular emphasis on "right doctrine" common to the Presbyterian body.

On Sunday evening, November 22nd, at the home of Robert and Joan Crawford the P.Y.P.S. welcomed the Rev. L. Keith Daniel, Brampton Baptist Church, who spoke on the subject, "The Baptists—Yesterday and Today." A large group of young people heard Mr. Daniel trace the early history of the Baptists emerging out of the Reformation period with their particular desire for liberty of worship and freedom in the local congregation. He compared the Baptist Church and the Presbyterian Church in regard to the government, local practice and comparable outlook.

Whereas the one lay much importance upon the Presbytery, the other depended entirely upon the local rule with fellowship in a larger association of Baptist Churches. The Doctrine of Baptism and the Baptist contention in its regard was discussed with Mr. Daniel saying that "despite the fact that the overwhelming majority of Christians adhered to paedobaptism (infant baptism), the Baptists felt strongly justified in their assertions regarding believer's baptism."

After the address many questions were directed to the speaker by the assembled young people regarding Baptist missions, the place of women in the Baptist Church, the form and ritual of the baptismal act, the method of instructing a new Christian, the "call" from a congregation to a minister and the various groupings with in the Baptist Church.

The Worship Convener, Joan Crawford, led the Devotional period with Victor Ostrander leading in prayer and Shirley Fendley reading the portion of Holy Scripture. After the reading of minutes by the secretary, Ruth Ismond, a discussion took place regarding the singing of Christmas Carols on Christmas Eve and it was decided to do this especially in

**Rev. Lloyd Freel Heads Credit Ministers Group**

The regular monthly meeting of the Credit Valley Ministerial Association was held in the First Baptist Church on Wednesday with a fine turnout of members. At the November meeting each year occurs the election of officers and the new executive for 1960, is as follows: Honorary president, Rev. W. M. Murdock; Immediate Past President, Rev. G. L. The Ministerial was first organized in November, 1956, when a meeting of interested clergymen met in the Presbyterian Manse, Norval, to unify efforts in the Georgetown and surrounding districts. The aims were to be mutual fellowship, exchange of ideas and methods, to consider problems common to all Churches, and to make known publicly the thought of the Christian Church in modern society's dilemma.

Due to the movement of ministers to other charges Rev. L. Whan became vice president and Rev. E. V. Warren became secretary-treasurer. Later Rev. L. N. Freel succeeded Mr. Warren as secretary-treasurer and now becomes president for the approaching year.
