Helped Found Halton Holstein Breeders Club

Thomas Bird, well known as an Esqueing Township farmer, died on Thursday November 26th at his home 48 Maple Ave. W., after a brief illness.

Born in Cumberland County England, he came to Canada with his parents as an infant and spent his earlier years in the Norval area. He attended school and made his start in farming there.

He married Sarah McLean of Erin Township in 1896. After years of farming near Norval he moved with his family to the Scotch Block area of Esqueing Township where four sons are now farming, Norman and Hector on the fifth line, Milton on the 6th and John on the 7th. A daughter Effie is teaching on the staff of Faywood Public School, North York Township, and a second daughter, Elsie, lives at the Maple Ave. home to which Mr. and Mrs. Bird retired in 1951.

They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1946 and their diamond anniversary three years ago. Mrs. Bird predeceased her husband in January of this year.

He is survived by two brothers, William of London and James of Niagara Falls.

Mr. Bird was a member of St. John's United Church where he served on the session for many years. As a farmer he had been in dairying all his life and took special interest in the development of the Halton County Holstein Breeders Association of which he was president in 1930.

The funeral service was conducted in St. John's United Church on Saturday at 1 p.m. by Rev. M. G. McFarlane and interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery Norval. The pallbearers were Robert Alexander, Norman Cameron, Robert J. Cunningham, Graham Farnell, Victor MacDonald and H. Crag Reid.
