Mr. Hall gave high praise to Georquetown for having an outstanding fair grounds, with a well located grandstand, and pointed out that aside from agricultural features, the social side of a country fair did something which is looked forward to by town and country people. His sentiments were echoed by Roy Currie, a district 5 director and past president of Milton Fair who said Georquetown has the best grounds of the ten fairs he had attended this season.

Sandy Best, M.P.P. complimented the directors on their "smooth organization" and said that Georquetown provides a show-window for the district's agriculture. Greetings were brought from Action Agricultural Society by another guest, Lloyd McEnery, president of that group.

County Ag. Rep. Al Francis said he appreciated the opportunity to attend the function for the first time since he was appointed to the post and extended an invitation to attend open house in the department's new offices in Milton on January 6th.
