75 Deer Tallied, District Hunters in North Jaunt

Swelled by 34 deer taken by a large party hunting in the Magnetawan area Georgetown and district men took part in hunts which accounted for some 75 deer this year.

Many of the parties, however, were not nearly so fortunate as the aforementioned one joined by Andy Crichton of town. The party comprised London, Hamilton hunters from Rockwood, Thamesville and Brampton and they reported generally good weather. Their were 36 in the party and they were away 10 days.

Jack Crichton was with the Pine Lake Hunt Club on a week's hunt near Bracebridge that netted the party of 12 deer. They were handicuffed two days by rain and fog.

Hunting the Snow Road district near Peterboro Harold Smellie of Norval and a party of 10 from Streetsville, Brampton and Orangeville bagged their quota after two weeks. They reported sighting a lot of game.

A party of 11 including Chief Roy Haley, Tony Martin, Guy Rodgers, Roland Awrey of town, and seven Brampton men combed the Tory Hill district in the Haliburton County vicinity for a week and came out with nine.

On Manitoulin Island the largest party of local men including Don Barrager, Murt Allison, Vern Archer, Bob Lane and his brother Art of Toronto, Nels Robinson, Dunc Robinson, Don Wingrove, Russ Kelly, Bill Ritchie, Ken Hearn, Hornby, Dr. G. Robinson and his brother Brent Robinson of Toronto, Andy Lang, Hillsburgh and Jack Perrott of Churchville, fifteen in all, brought out 4 deer after 10 days.

Despite heavy snow a party of seven men, Don Hancock, Gene Logan, George Hgare, Roy Wiggins, Bob Heaton, Russ Robinson, and guide John Turley of Huntsville hunted that area for one week taking 3.

Also reporting home with three was a ten man party including Walter Thompson and Carman Copland of town and others from Palgrave, Bolton and Brampton. They searched the Parry Sound, Skeleton Lake areas for a week and like many of the other parties experienced some bad weather.

Also taking one deer were Bill Garbutt of town and Grant Nadill of Kitchener who tried the Marstay district near Sudbury for a week and one day at Elliott Lake.

Vic Gunn and George Finney of town had no luck in a three day hunt near Burwash where Mr. Finney is a guard. Rain and fog made conditions poor.

Herb Roehler, Harold Bennett, Walter Richardson, Ky Spence, Keith Tracy of town and Jimmie Common of Toronto did some moose hunting at Gogama a hundred miles west of New Liskeard and bagged two of the big animal, one of them measuring 56" across the antlers. They were away eight days.

PLAQUE DEDICATED IN PASTOR'S MEMORY

The 16-year-old ministry of the Rev. J. C. Wilson was the longest in the 114-year history of Knox Presbyterian Church Acton. He was the sixth in a succession of 13 ministers, Sunday morning, a bronze plaque was presented and dedicated in loving memory of the Rev. Wilson and his wife, Mary Elizabeth Duff. Three sons, two daughters, grandchildren and great grandchildren were among 15 members of the family attending the dedication service conducted by Rev. Andrew McKenzie.

Presented by the eldest son, Dr. Duff Wilson, of Ayre, the plaque was placed between two north windows, near the front of Knox Church.

It bears the following inscription: "To the Glory of God, And in Loving Memory of Rev.

James Calvin Wilson, 1867-1924, Minister of this congregation, 1903-1919. And of His Wife, Mary Elizabeth Duff, 1868-1958. Erected by their sons and daughters.

Family visitors included: two daughters: Miss Jean Wilson, Toronto; Mrs. J. E. McGillivray, Weyburn Saskatchewan; and sons Dr. Duff Wilson, Kitchener; Calvin and Findlay, of Toronto.

The Honourable Attorney-General has announced that a substantial cash prize, to be known as the Jack Hammell Highway Safety Suggestion Award, will be presented to the person who submits in writing the best idea, or suggestion, on the subject of Traffic Safety, to the District Inspector of the Ontario Provincial Police in his or her respective district on or before December 10th, 1959.

To be eligible, each entry in this contest must be no more than 150 words in length, must clearly outline some concrete suggestion for promoting Highway Traffic Safety and must be received at the office of the District Inspector not later than 12 o'clock noon on Thursday, December 10th next. All mailed entries must be post-marked not later than 12 o'clock noon on Wednesday, December 9th, 1959.

Submissions will be judged solely on the basis of merit and originality, following which a cash prize of \$50.00 will be awarded to the winner in each of the seventeen districts of the O.P.P. In addition a grand prize of \$150.00 will be presented to the person who submits the entry adjudged to contain the best idea from all seventeen districts.

Personnel of the Ontario Provincial Police, including clerical staff are not eligible for this contest.

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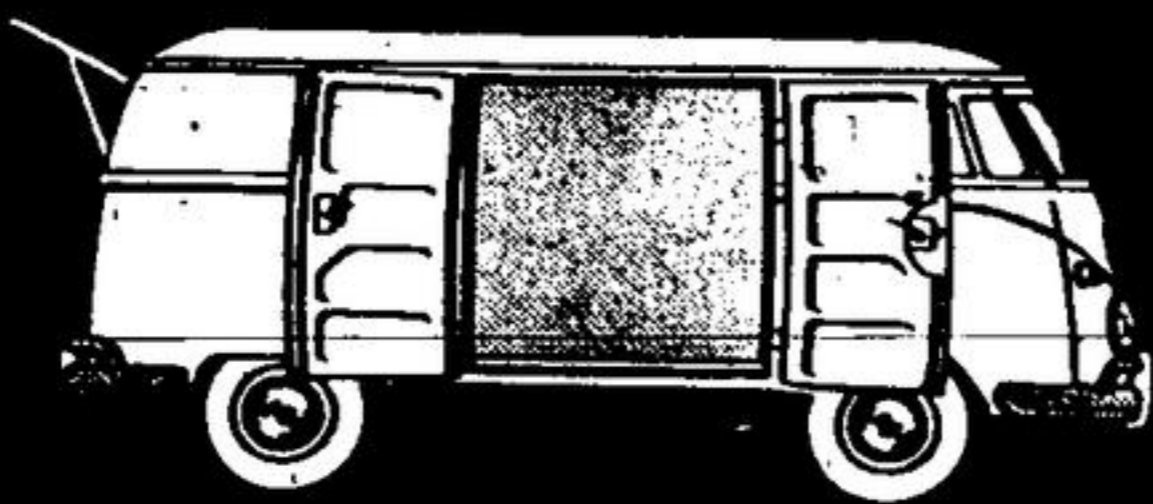
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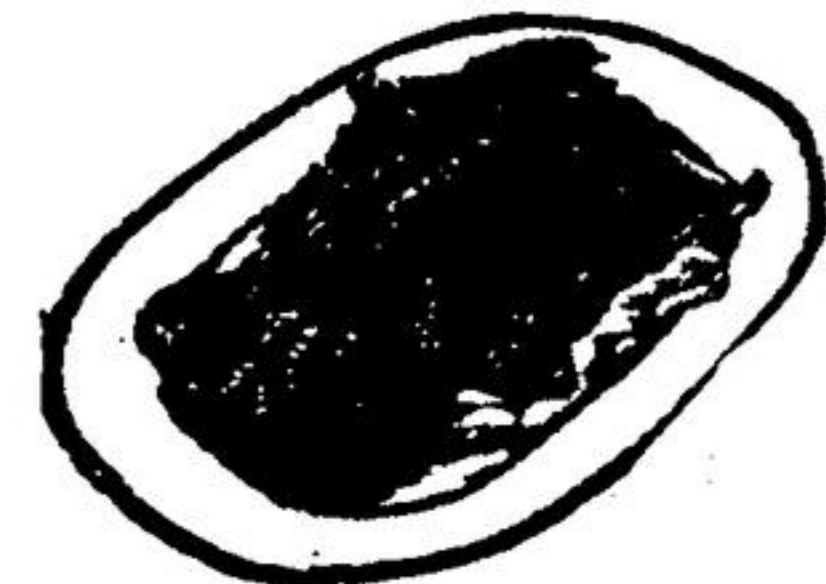
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
