## The Battling Buttermilk Brigade

Round about this time of year, when the wind begins to blow cold, surviving members of the Buttermilk Brigade think of those chilly days and nights at Passchendaele.

It was in the Belgian fall and early winter of 1917, a time of rain and snow, when the mud oozed over boots and inches steadily up to the axles of the big guns, and it was so cold it was a comfort even to slide into a dugout and warm hands above a candle flame.

Taking part at Passchendaele, scene of the epic First World War battle, was the 43rd Canadian Battery, a 200-man, six-gun unit recruited in late 1915 by an elderly Guelph cattle breeder and veteran of the Boer War, lieutenant Lt. Col. David McCrae. The father of Lt. Col. John McCrae, who wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields," Col. McCrae told students at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and the University of Toronto that he wanted athletic non-drinkers in his battery, preferably men with good academic records. Soon wags had dubbed it the Buttermilk Brigade.

Twenty abstainers from Knox College, six from the School of Practical Science at the University of Toronto and others from Toronto and Guelph hurried to join, but despite Col. McCrae's hopes, non-drinkers were, before long, in the minority, and recruiting officer George Cooke heard more than one whisky voice as he bent over information sheets, at Guelph Armories.

"These college guys ha- quered this here battery," said one disgruntled member of the 43rd, ranking at outsiders' taunts about the Buttermilk Brigade, the Presbyterian Battery and the dry battery. But at the front he changed his tune when the "rah rah college boys" showed they could grease a gun or groom a muck with the best. And when at night the rum ration was brought down the firing line and the abstainers declined (leaving more for everyone else) he would raise his brimming cup and smile.

One of five artillery units recruited in Guelph in the First World War, the 43rd went overseas in February of 1916, the men supplied with only the uniforms on their backs. Equipped, trained and reorganized at Bramshot and Witley, England, the battery went into action at Ypres in July. During the next two years they fought at the Somme, Vimy, Lens, Passchendaele, Arras, Amiens and elsewhere, usually wherever the action was heaviest.

When Armistice was declared the 43rd counted 40 of its numbers dead, but among the survivors were many who rose to prominence in private life, including Frank Weldon Beatty, Surveyor-General of Ontario; Robert Alexander MacKay, Can-

ada's ambassador to Norway; Dr. James Mutchmor, Secretary of the United Church Evangelical and Social Service branch; and Dr. Ivan Junkin, chief anesthetist at Toronto's Sick Children's Hospital.

Each spring ex-members of the battery come together at a garden party in Georgetown, Ont., and for a reunion in Toronto each fall. Their numbers are dwindling, but 36 from as far away as Winnipeg and Prince Edward Island met in Toronto in October to recall old battles, the meals of punk (bread) and pig (bacon), the exploits of such as Greaser Mullins and Edgar Pip—and maybe to twit the teetotalers, just one more time.
