Taking part at Passchendaele. cene of the epic First World War battle, was the 43rd Canadian Battery, a 200-man, sixgun unit recruited in late 1915 by an elderly Guelph cattle breeder and veteran of the Boer War, teetotaler Lt.-Col David McCrae. The father of John McCrae, who wrote the poem in Flanders Fields, Col. McCrae told students at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and the University of Toronto that he wanted athletic non-drinkers in his battery, preferably men with good academic records. Soon wags had dubbed it the Buttermilk Brigade.

Twenty abstainers from Knox College, six from the School of Practical Science at the University of Toronto and others from Toronto and Guelph hurried to join, but despite Col. McCrae's hopes, non-drinkerswere, before long, in the minority, and recruiting officer George Cooke heard more than one whisky voice as he, bent over information sheets, at Guelph Armories

"These college guys has queered this here battery," said one disgruntled member of the 43rd, rankling at outsiders launts about the Buttermilk Brigade, the Presbyterian Battery and the dry battery. But at the front he changed his tune when the 'rah rah college boys' showed they could grease a gun or groom a moke with the best. Driving conditions were poor at the time and the car skidded on the icey road. Cst Ron Rankine made the investigation.




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
