WHAT COUNCIL DID Charges Council Filibusters With Lengthy Nomination Speeches

Voicing his objection to the procedure employed at Thursday's nomination meeting, ratepayer Humphrey Martyn, 101 Main St. South termed the unlimited speaking time allotted candidates "a travesty of justice" and charged councillors with filibustering, when he addressed council in protest Monday night.

"It was a suppression of free speech and the public should know about it," he said. Mr. Martyn favoured restricting the candidates to five minutes each. He also took issue with town clerk Clarence Benham's action in prohibiting questions from the floor.

"The electors have a constitutional right to ask questions," he said, "so that certain candi-

WHAT COUNCIL DID Wants Recompense, Clothing Is Damaged By Dirty Town Water

An investigation to see if the water main flushing can be stepped up and possibly changed system-wise was the result of a letter to council by G. H. Mundy of 21 Stevens Cresc., claiming the town was responsible for the loss of a number of clothes through dirty water.

Mr. Mundy in writing said that several batches of laundry had been ruined by the dirty water and the wash is now being sent out to a commercial laundry. He maintained that if the laundry is successful in cleaning the clothes the town should pay for the service, and, if not, the town should replace the clothes.

Town Engineer Geoffrey Bligh pointed out that Stevens Crescent is the low spot in the pressure system and therefore the water used by the people in that district would show a higher content of dirt after each flushing.

Deputy Reeve Walter Gray questioned the effect of the flushing.

"The muddy water problem is becoming gradually better," replied Mr. Bligh, "and once its cleaned up it will stay clean."

The matter was turned over to the town's insurance firm. Another letter on the dirty water problem was also received from Frank Cleave, 19 McNabb St.

WHAT COUNCIL DID Says Should Have Tax Rebate, Roads So Bad

Objecting to having to deal with what he termed 'a third party' in the matter of roads in the Delrex east end, G. H. Mundy, 21 Stevens Cresc., visited council Monday seeking action on ungraded roads there.

"That portion of our taxes, which would have been used for roads should be rebated," charged Mr. Mundy, pointing out that some of the streets in that area had been graded while others were left untouched.

"If Mr. Heap doesn't do it council is responsible and council must assume that responsibility," said Cr. Ern Hyde.

Deputy Reeve Walter Gray agreed. "The people there have been told that the roads were going to be graded and if that has not been done we should see that something is done. Where grading has been done the grader has done a fair job. I'm in sympathy with Mr. Mundy."

Town Engineer Geoffrey Bligh interjected: "Area have been grading the roads until freezing weather prohibited it further. He pointed out that grading a frozen road would leave the surface in worse condition than it is now."

Deputy Reeve Gray promised that if it was at all possible some repairs would be made this week. The matter was left to the engineering and road department.
