Elect Campbell Sinclair 1960 Reeve of Esquesing

Sprowl Heads Poll For School Board

Veteran reeve George Currie was edged by Deputy Reeve Campbell Sinclair Monday when Esquesing voters elected Sinclair to the reeve ship by a 55-vote majority. Sinclair polled 619 votes and Currie 564, with 40 per cent of the voters going to the polls.

In a rare election for public school trustee, a newcomer Mac Sprowl, headed the polls with a majority of 152 over board chairman Robert J. Cunningham. Another present member Clarence Coles also retained his seat.

Deputed in the 5-man race for other seats were another board member Stanley J. Brown and a Glen Williams resident, Thomas Hill.

Both cars were totally wrecked when the Kennedy car skidded broadside in front of the eastbound car driven by Wright. The vehicles were welded together by the force of the impact.

A passenger in the Kennedy car, Mrs. Robert Fréché, also of town, is in hospital with a broken leg and severe head cuts. The accident occurred at about 6 p.m.

Mr. Kennedy leaves his wife the former Margaret Mitchell, and children Roy and Susan. They came here from England four years ago. The other driver was the brother of Denny Wright, 8 John St. E.

Mayor Nomination Set for Tuesday

With over 48% of voters going to the polls, Georgetown elected a deputy reeve and six councillors on Monday. A total of 2380 or 4941 registered ratepayers voted.

Walter Gray topped contender James Emmerson by 522 votes to retain the deputy reeveship. Reeve Doug Sargent had previously been returned by acclamation.

Heading the council poll were two present councillors, John Elliott and Fred (Tut) Harrison with 1241 and 1139. A council member several years ago, and a former town clerk, John D. Kelly received 1078 votes in third position.

Another councillor, John Gunn was re-elected in fifth position, while newcomers William F. Hunter and Ian Cass, chosen fourth and sixth, will also be members of the 1960 council.

Two 1959 councillors were defeated in the 15-man race. Veteran Gartfield McGillivray, who has headed the polls on numerous occasions, trailed in seventh position. Completing a

term as Georgetown's first lady councillor, Mrs. Anne Currie was also a loser.

A question vote on a 2-year council term was decisively turned down by 2 to 1.

Top office of mayor is still to be filled and a second nomination meeting is scheduled next Tuesday. Cr. Ern Hyde has indicated his intention of standing for this office. If an election is necessary it will be held on Monday, December 28th.

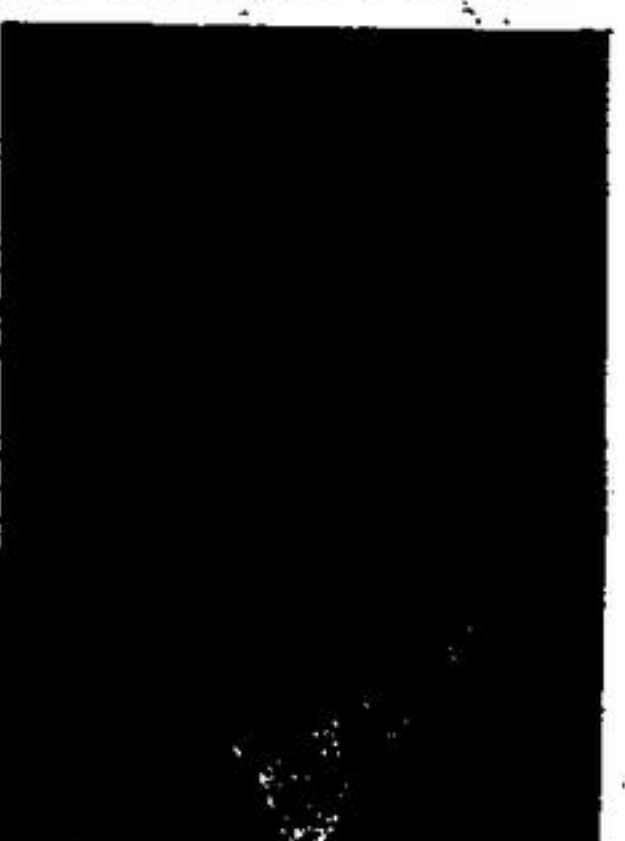

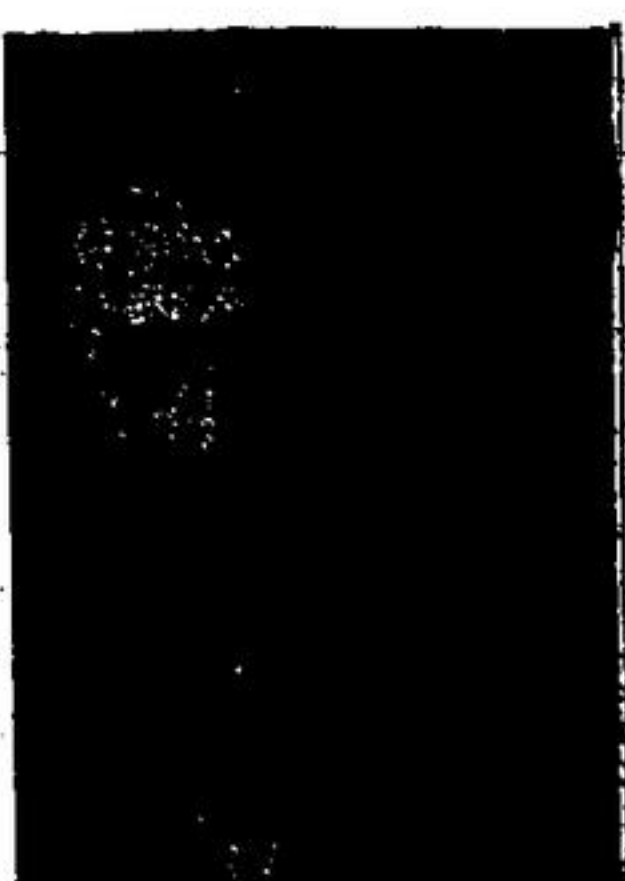
