Pay \$2.20 a Pound For Winter Fair Steer

George Earley, a 16-year-old 4-H Club member from Kerwood, northwest of London, brought his Royal Agricultural Winter Fair earnings up to \$2,131 Saturday.

The young farmer, who is known to his friends around Kerwood as Geordie, had won the Queen's Guinness, top 4-H Club prize, earlier in the week and claimed \$250 with his Aberdeen Angus steer. Saturday morning, along with other market animals, the steer went on the auction block and brought \$2.20 a pound from Dominion Stores Ltd., and, since the steer tipped the scales at 855 pounds, this put a fair number of dollars in Geordie's pocket.

Actually he wasn't the top man in the auction, but he was in fast company, for the top steer was the grand champion Hereford, which brought only 10 cents more a pound for the McIntyre Ranching Co., of Lethbridge, Alta., for a total of \$2,093. At the end of the day Geordie was ahead of the big time cattlemen in actual cash per pound of beef shown.

Prices at the closing auction were good for the most part, and at no time slipped as low as current beef prices on the Toronto market, although one animal did hit a bottom of 29 cents a pound.

The reserve grand champion, a Shorthorn shown by R. Larry Gardhouse, of Milton, brought 80 cents a pound from Essex Packers, and weighed 890 pounds. The champion Hereford an 890-pound entry of Ed Noad, of High River, Alta., got a bid of 55cents from Shopsy's, and the champion Angus, an 800-pound steer shown by John Hepburn, of Campbellville, brought 45 cents from Canada Packers.

The reserve Guinness steer, a Shorthorn entered by Ken Black, of Belgrave, 835 pounds of top quality beef, got 45 cents a pound from Stirling Packers Ltd., bidding for Greenspans.

The champion group of five steers, shown by Byers Flour Mills Ltd., Camrose, Alta., brought 37 cents from Swift Canadian Ltd., Edmonton, while their champion carload was sold to Canada Packers Ltd., heaviest purchasers of the day.
