

Conservation Is Topic At Farm Forum Rally

Halton County annual Farm Forum rally was held in Fairview school Lowville, November 25th with all county forum groups represented.

Mr. Fisher from Ontario Planning and Development explained many activities along conservation lines being carried on in Halton. He showed a film, "Proud Lands" which showed very clearly the necessity for, and benefits to be derived from the proper care and use of the soil. The Senior Actor in the film ended by saying "Some call it conservation, I call it common sense."

Mr. Francis spoke briefly. Also Mr. Ferguson, Zone chairman, who said there is still a need for Farm Forum. He described it as the greatest two-way communications on the air today.

MODE Will Increase Aid Program For Refugees

The National President, Mrs. A. K. Richardson, reported that from its November National Executive Committee meeting the members had given their unanimous support to World Refugee Year and agreed that the most practical method was to increase its overseas programme of assistance to refugees.

Mrs. Richardson stated that the I.O.D.E. had spent more than a million and a quarter (\$1,249,798) on its refugee work from 1942-1958. Approximately half of this amount came from Chapters in Ontario.

Since the beginning of 1959, Ontario Chapters have shipped 602 tons of new clothing to the British Save the Children Fund for distribution, also new clothing, powdered milk and X-ray supplies have been shipped to Korea, in all to the value of \$20,178.

As this year has been designated World Refugee Year, Ontario Chapters are sponsoring orphaned refugee children. To date, 70 children have been sponsored—90% of these children are of school age.

UNIQUE WAY OF AIDING LOCAL HOSPITAL FUND

If ingenuity means anything, then Georgetown's Rotary Club goes to the 'top of the list' for their new venture in helping raise funds for the new hospital.

Past president Bill Hamilton is heading a committee that as he puts it "has Santa Claus available in all shapes and sizes."

This is the initial party of this kind, and is being combined with a Christmas tree for the children of members. Georgetown Election Sets Numerical Record

While Georgetown's 1959 municipal vote set a numerical record, the percentage fell far short of a 1949 record when over 80% of the populace voted. This year 2380 voters were registered of 4941 eligible voters, or 48.16%. It was an upswing from 1958 when 1773 people voted, representing 36.8% of 4813 eligible.

In 1955, 1350 voters represented 50%. In 1951, 1371 voters tallied a 70% vote. In record year 1949, in a much smaller town, 1503 ballots were cast.
