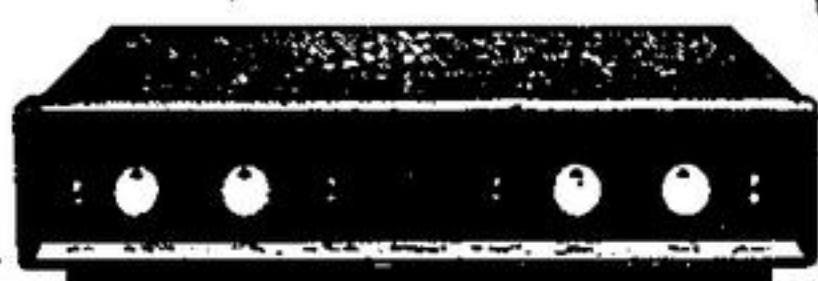

**Injured Trucker Trapped
In Overtaken Vehicle**

A truck driver for Otto Construction Ltd., Victor Gault, of Shakespeare was rushed to Guelph Hospital with deep lacerations and possible concussion early last Wednesday morning after firemen pried him from his overturned cab at the base of Norval Hill.

With two of the truck's three fuel tanks leaking gas onto the ground, Gault layed trapped on the passenger side of the cab until firemen arrived at about 4.30 a.m. Dr. Alistair McIntosh treated Gault at the scene before he was taken to hospital.

The injured man was driving the second of two trucks southbound down Norval Hill and was approaching the base when a car came around the corner on the wrong side of the road. The first truck driven by Mr. R. Otto who operates the construction firm had already navigated the turn but Gault was forced off the road.

Churchill Was A
Malcontent, Too**

The Georgetown Herald.

Dear Sir:
Sir Winston Churchill (no mean "Malcontent" in his day), writing of Magna Carta said:

"In future ages it was to be used as the foundation of principles and systems of government of which neither King John nor his nobles dreamed. Thus was created the glorious legend of the 'Charter of an Englishman's liberties'."

Since that day in June 1215, the Anglo-Saxon has striven continuously in behalf of these liberties and down through the ages evil men have sought to deprive him of them.

It is as well then to reflect on these simple truths in the light of the tumult in our town during the past few months. For, once again, we have been witness to the picture of a "few malcontents" — believing in their traditional and constitutional rights to oppose that which they felt was unjust and against the common weal by

libertines in their place of local government, and by letters to the local press, drawing the attention of the people of Georgetown to certain matters which were in hand, and which those same few malcontents currently believed to be inimical to the best interests of the Town.

As they herd the final results of yesterday's municipal election, the hearts of those few rebellious citizens must have warmed to the realization that an overwhelming majority of their fellow electors had joined with them in showing their discontent, making use of the one sure constitutional weapon which has always, in the fullness of time, so inevitably achieved the downfall of the arrogant and of those too blind to see. May it ever be so.
