## MILTON MINISTER CALLED BY TORONTO PRESBYTERIANS

Rev. Ernest Orsborn, minister at Knox Presbyterian Church in Milton for the past nine years, will be leaving to accept a new charge at Dufferin St. Presbyterian, Toronto, at the end of January it was announced this week.

Rev. Orsborn, his wife and two children came to Milton in 1950 and he was inducted as Knox minister on December 1, 1950. During this past nine years, he recalled, the congregation at Knox has made considerable progress and raised a large sum of money for improvements to the church and manse. Largest project of the congregation during this period was the \$55,000 Sunday school renovation which was completed last November.

Mr. Orsborn, in an interview this week, paid a tribute to the business and professional people of Milton. "I have received nothing but the most respectable, courteous treatment from all of them," he remarked. He also complimented Rev. D. A. Powell and Rev. J. L. Graham and their congregations at Grace Anglican and St. Paul's United churches for their cooperation with Knox adherents, especially with the Centennial church program, the Week of Prayer observance and the vacation bible schools. "Their cordiality and co-operation has been very helpful," he said.

During his term in Milton, Mr. Orsborn has represented the public school trustees on the Milton Library Board, and helped organize both the 1953 Coronation and the 1957 Centennial religious observances. He has also held various committee positions with the West Toronto Presbytery. Prior to coming here, he served as minister at Meaford, Lachute, P.Q., and Montreal for 20 years.

No replacement for Mr. Orsborn has been named by the Knox congregation. Rev. A. J. Calder of Georgetown will serve as interim moderator until a new minister is inducted. Mr. Orsborn will preach his last two services in Milton on Sunday, January 31, 1960.

## Belfountain Park Cost Province Pays 50%

William G. Davis, M.P.P., announced today that the Honourable W. M. Nickle, Minister of Planning and Development had informed him that the Government of the Province of Ontario has approved a grant of \$23,800.00 representing 50% of the total cost of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority acquisition of 22 acres of land known as Belfountain Park.

The entire area of which 14 acres is woodland, 3 acres in a created pond and 5 acres open space is being purchased by the Authority for use as a conservation area under terms of the Provincial Conservation Act.

In announcing the Government's participation in the purchase of the project, Mr. Nickle stated that during his recent visit to the Belfountain district he had seen the park area and was glad to announce that the Province was making this grant to ensure that the citizens of the Credit area as well as visitors to Belfountain would continue to be able to enjoy and use this lovely site.

Mr. Davis stated that as Belfountain park is noted for its natural rugged beauty and variety of plant life it would lend itself to the establishment of nature trail and nature study areas for the children. This clear section of the Credit river makes, he stated, an excellent spot for supervised swimming and for family picnics.

Close contests for the deputy reeve, six councillors and school trustee were features of the municipal elections held in Milton. Arthur Desjardine, a former councillor, was elected reeve over incumbent R. C. Cunningham. Mrs. Mary Pettit retained her position as deputy reeve in a 38 vote lead over former mayor J. M. Ledwith.

Only 16 votes separated two contestants seeking election for the north ward school trustee with Mrs. Muriel Kernighan the victor over David T. Green.

John Rush, long time member of the Milton Hydro-Electric Commission was returned, defeating challenger Frank Jones, 907 to 402.

## Hog Producers Favour Present Marketing System

Halton Hog Producers' Association is to meet Monday evening to change their method of sale of hogs to the Halton agricultural leaders on Wednesday, December 2, when they sat down to a sumptuous supper of roast pork provided by the ladies of Hornby United church.

In the group were presidents of agricultural societies, dairy, poultry and cream producer organizations, Federation of Agriculture, agriculture committee of county council and members of the Hog Producers' Association.

Clayton Frey, vice-president of the Ontario Hog Producers' Association was guest speaker and provincial secretary James Bayton and Ben Steves, zone three director, were also present.

Mr. Frey briefly outlined some of the problems facing agriculture from a marketing standpoint and expressed concern that the pressure by the meat packers' council upon the Minister of Agriculture might cause the government to curtail the Hog Producers' Marketing Board to change their method of sale of hogs to an auction or Dutch clock method. He reaffirmed his belief that it should always be the prerogative of the producers to decide the method of sale of their products.

Following Mr. Frey's address a period of questions and discussion took place which was very enlightening to all present. It resulted in the following resolution being passed by a standing vote of those present:

Moved by George Robertson, seconded by Cliff Brown, "That this meeting go on record as being in favor of the present method of selling hogs in the province of Ontario and that it continue in use until a better method satisfactory to the hog producers is found."

Thirty voted in favor of the resolution with two opposed. Provincial visitors abstained from voting.

H. Armstrong, county president, was chairman of the meeting.
