Zoning Changes are Left For 1960 Council Consideration

Recommendations by the Planning Board to change zoning in three parts of town came before council for discussion Monday. With unanimity of opinion on none of the proposals among councillors, the matter was shelved for action by next year's council.
One recommendation would change the southwest Highway-Maple Ave. corner to commercial. The property owned by Mrs. J. B. Wilson, has been optioned by Loblaw's, according to Reeve Sargent.
Another would change the north side of John St. W., from the railway tracks to Mountainview from its present agricultural zoning to residential, and change a small section of Emory St. from industrial to residential.
A third would initiate action on the former Moore farm, changing it from agricultural to a mixture of residential, commercial and industrial.
The Maple Ave plan met opposition by Reeve Sargent and Cr. Harrison, but for different reasons. The reeve is against "strip zoning" The councillor is not in favour unless a town-owned Maple property behind the Georgetown Dairy is also zoned commercial.
While there was no opposition to the John Street proposal it was included in a suggested by-law which also contained the Moore farm proposal and here council decided it was too big a matter for adequate discussion on the last meeting of the year.
Action to change the Moore property from its present agricultural status to a broad land use in the official plan of the town is preliminary to any subdivision. It was explained by Mayor Armstrong. Should the council approve this first step, the next move would be to rezone the farm into specific areas which would mean a Municipal Board hearing when complaints could be registered, if any. Later, the property owners could ask for approval of a plan of subdivision which must be approved by both town council and Ontario Dept. of Plan-

Merchants Get Christmas Spirit Plan Nickels For Overdue Meters

The Christmas spirit may spread to parking fines if a plan mentioned to council Monday by Paul Barber, president of Georgetown Businessmen's Association is implemented.
Mr. Barber said businessmen are considering two ideas for the Christmas shopping season. One would be to let the shopping bags over the meters and have merchants rent the meters from the town for the holiday period. The other would be to have someone put an extra nickel in an overdue meter and a courtesy card put on a car's windshield.
The latter is his own choice, he said, and a majority of councillors expressed their agreement.
Mayor Armstrong said a by-law amendment would be necessary for the bag idea. Cr. Hyde thought the bags would defeat the purpose of meters which were not installed as a money-making idea, but to keep parking space circulating.
Reminded by Deputy Reeve Gray that an hour is a short time for a Christmas shopper to park, the mayor said that it is possible to park for two hours by leaving an extra nickel in a meter.
Asking that action be expedited on a recent request from downtown merchants for establishment of a public parking area on a cost-sharing basis, Mr. Barber said he had hoped a council-merchant committee might have met by now to consider the proposal. Meanwhile, he asked that potholes in the present parking lot be filled, snow removed and ice sand-

The property committee was detailed to investigate the parking lot proposal, but with a new council incoming, it is doubtful if any discussions will take place until the new year. Meanwhile, council promised snow removal for the parking lot, and remedial action to put it in better shape.

Minor Damage When Car Skids On Road

An automobile accident opposite Lanes Whitehouse Service Station on Guelph St., early Sunday morning caused approximately \$50 damage to a car driven by James Albert Cluney of 7 Norton Cres.
The accident happened at about 2:30 a.m. when the Cluney car, a 1954 Ford, skidded off the highway. The vehicle plunged into the north ditch where it struck a tree and turned completely around finally coming to rest with the rear of the car in the ditch and facing southwest.
The driver was uninjured in the smash which Cr. Evan Rollins investigated.

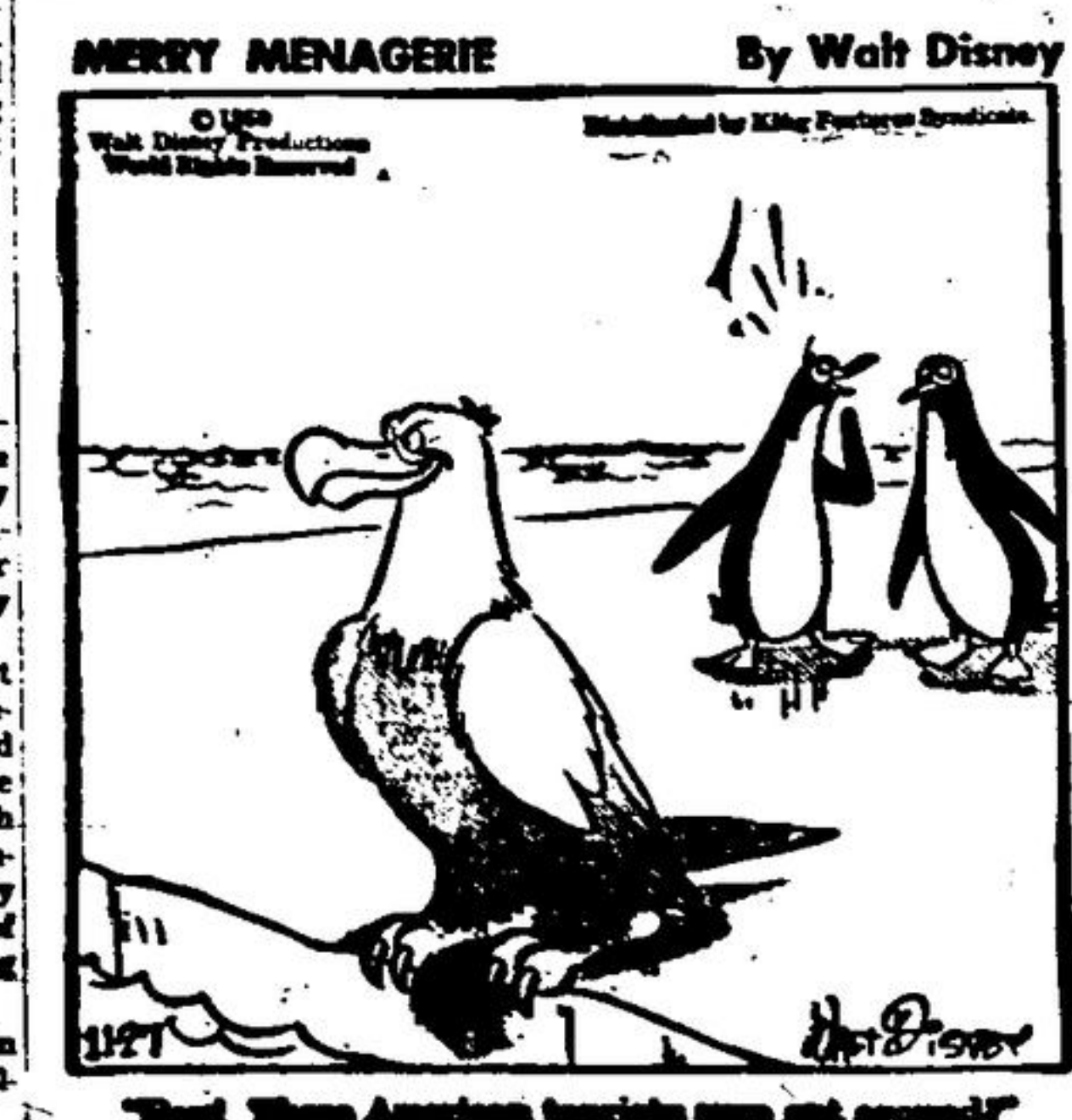
