Mrs. Geo. Herrington, 75, Served As Practical Nurse

Mrs. Edith Whitnee (Kennedy) Herrington, a member of St. John's Ambulance Association as a practical nurse for many years, died at Centennial Manor, Milton, on Tuesday, December 22nd, at the age of 75.

She was born the daughter of Sarah Hartup and George Whitnee in Bletchley, England, and attended Ravenshoe Schools, coming to Peterboro in 1912, moving a short time later to Georgetown where she had resided since. Having been trained as a nurse she worked for many years in the community as a practical nurse. In 1915 she married Lewis Kennedy of Georgetown who died on September 2nd, in 1924. They had two children, both of whom survive, Clarence Emerson Kennedy of 2 Water St., Georgetown, and Bruce Bernard Kennedy of Upper Canada Drive, Willowdale. Their children and her grandchildren, also are left, Douglas and Terry Kennedy, Georgetown, and Cheryl and Lynne Kennedy of Willowdale.

In 1928 she married George W. Herrington who predeceased her in 1951. She was the stepmother of Corey, Orby, and Donald Herrington, Grace (Mrs. Fred Brown) all of Georgetown. Mrs. Herrington was a great lover of flowers and her garden at her home at the corner of Guelph and Water Streets where she lived for over forty years was always a beautiful sight.

In 1953 Mrs. Herrington made a three month trip to England and this was the only time that she visited her homeland since arriving in Canada. While in England she visited with a brother and sister who survive, Cecil Whitnee of Northampton and Mrs. Lillian Richardson of Blackpool. Another brother, Oliver, is also left, who lives at R.R. 4, Georgetown. Brothers and sisters who predeceased here are Walter of Georgetown, John, Mrs. Winnie O'Donnell, Mrs. Annie Carpenter, Mrs. Elizabeth Cockrell, Ethel, Mrs. Eva Meed, all of England.

Rev. Lloyd Whan of First Baptist Church, conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith St., Georgetown, Thursday, December 24th. Pallbearers were John T. Armstrong, Douglas Cole, Don Herrington, Frank Whitnee, Don Brinklow, all of Georgetown and Marvin Goldblatt of Rochester, New York. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

New Year Celebrations Differ In Other Lands

Not everyone celebrates the beginning of the New Year on January 1. But people in all parts of the world have special customs to ensure that the New Year will get off to a good start.

Church services and frantic parties, for example, are typical ways of celebrating in America.

In many European countries, gifts are exchanged on New Year's Day. The custom originated with the Romans, according to World Book Encyclopedia. Back in 747 B.C., reportedly, they presented the king of the Sabines with branches of bay and palm trees consecrated to Sirena, the goddess of strength. The "strewn" or gifts, became more elaborate, in expectation of royal favor, and the emperors came to regard them as deserved tribute.

Augustus Caesar is said to have passed the word along that he had had a vision in which he saw himself receiving gifts from the Senate and the people on January 1.

Claudius finally stopped the influence-peddling by limiting the cost of gifts.

Henry III introduced the custom into England in the 1200's, and Elizabeth I collected enough loot to replenish her wardrobe for a year. The custom went out with Oliver Cromwell.

In Scotland, bad luck is in store for a family if the first person to set foot in the house on New Year's Day is a woman... or a gravedigger... or a person who walks with his toes turned in... or a man with red hair or blonde hair.

To minimize the risk, the Scots appoint a tall, dark man wishes the family good luck as the "first-footer." On New Year's Day he enters each house in silence, places a bun on the ground into old shoes on New Year's Day. And the Portuguese ignore their debts, because the man who pays a bill on this day will pay out money all year.

The Brazilians open the New Year by expressing the hope of all men... they designate January 1 as the Day of Universal Brotherhood.
