**Skeleton Raider Team is
Strong Enough for Orillia**

Just how strong are the Raiders?
That's the question the red-
shirts' coach must ask himself
after games like Monday night's
skirmish in Orillia when the to-
tals knocked off the home club
6 to 3 with just a skeleton team.
Ron Dixon's return to the
club plus the addition of Doug
Richardson from the Brampton
Jr. B 7's, offset by recent ab-
sence makes the team's scor-
ing much more difficult to assess.
Dave Voyce, Wayne Thomp-
son, Bob Demerse, Dave Irons,
Ron Dixon and Bill Chad-
wick stayed at home when the Raiders
made the Orillia trip but
most of them submitted letters
that excuse Voyce, Thompson,
Irons and Chadwick had to work
and Dixon was nursing a heavy
cold.

In his first appearance in a
Raider's uniform, Richardson
who played with Georgetown's
now defunct Junior C squad be-
fore becoming a top sniper
with Brampton, clinched a spot
with the Raiders by tallying
from Junior Beaumont but Or-
illia chopped the lead in half in
goal. He obtained his release
from the 7 Ups before the first
of the year to play here.

The Raider win balanced
their winless columns at 7 and
7.

Junior Beaumont broke Geo-
orgetown into the scoring on a
pass from Bud Vary after just
a minute and 19 seconds and
from there on out they were
never headed.

Long from Kennedy and Mon-

Vary recaptured the lead with
assistance from George Grashy
at 12:45. Blake Inglis guided

Orillia
twice at 15:52 and the combina-
tion was reversed a minute
later when "the Moose" trig-
