### Diary of a Vagabond

There were times during my experience as an editor when I was invited to eat my words by those who were not in accord with what I had taken in my paper. I never thought I would feel that I should go right out and start chewing on the patently re-coated branches of four trees. Only two weeks ago, I wrote about the beauty of such a phenomena of nature. Today, though the scene from my picture window is still the most spectacular show nature has staged in years, the broken branches and raised shrubs grieve my nature-loving heart.

It was during our safari into the ski country of northern Ontario, that we heard a broad-east warning of another impending sleet and ice storm. We decided to leave for home, though it was a sacrificial effort when we remembered the homemade lemons in the pie cupboard of our farmer friends and the goose that hung high for hasting next day.

The children balked at the way down, pretending to ignore the ice that already coated the train coach windows. The adults were warm and happy as we travelled along and had little or no pronouncement of the serious trouble and discomfort that lay ahead for all of us.

Just as the winter sun slid behind a slate gray cloud and disappeared for four days, there was a sudden silence. The power had gone off and the rhythmic hum of the furnace was stilled for 60 hours, only minutes after my arrival home. It is frightening how quickly winter daylight fades, especially when that servant of man, electricity, is as dead as last year's calendar. I groped around trying to remember where I had stored the candles when I put up the Christmas decorations. At this point I was quite cheerful. Power breaks in this modern age are usually only momentary, or at the worst, they might be without heat and light for an hour or so.

Going to bed with a few soda crackers under my belt, while clothed in slippers, socks and a granny nightie that had seen better days and was retrieved from the dust cloth bag, was only a minor inconvenience. I expected the power would go on any minute and as

### May Extend Patrol Force For Metro Conservation

Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's two-man patrol officer force may be doubled and headed by a chief.

The Authority's executive committee today heard a report on extending and revising the duties of the patrol officer system. The report pointed out that adequate police supervision "is a dire need now and will increase hand in hand with public use of the conservation areas."

It recommends that the force be enlarged to three officers and a chief with each officer assigned to patrol a specific watershed area—the Don, Humber, Etobicoke-Mimico, and the R-D-11P.

Extended duties of the force would include patrol and protection of Authority-owned lands, enforcement of regulations in the conservation areas as well as the Game and Fisheries Act, Liquor Control Act and Highway Traffic Act, assisting in

### Expect Sixty Entries In Brampton's Novice Hockey Tournament

Hockey midgets will be in vading Brampton during Easter vacation week April 10th to April 23rd, 1960 in the first large scale Canada-wide hockey tournament for novice age boys. To be known as the Brampton Novice Hockey Week, at least 60 teams are expected to take part representing most provinces, as well as a wide section of Ontario villages, towns and cities.

The Hockey Week for players under 10 years of age was of August 1st, 1959 is sponsored by the Brampton Lions Club and sanctioned by the OHA, with a multitude of community organizations lending their support to the large scale operation. Players will be lodged in pairs at private homes for sleeping accommodations, and breakfast while they remain in Brampton. Late side volunteer catering arrangements will be organized to serve approximately 1,200 meals to the expected 5,000 visiting players. The boys will get their first taste of a giant hockey tournament against teams from towns and cities that will suddenly become meaningful to the participants.

Classification by local population are as follows:

- A group, over 35,000 population, B group 7,501 to 35,000, C group 3,001 to 7,500, D group up to 3,000.

Champion and runner up will be declared in each classification and group champions will compete for the Grand Champion honors. Special tributes will be shown to teams journeying extreme distances to participate in the tournament. Recreational programs are being arranged to occupy leisure time daily for all players and accompanying adults during the tournament.

Communities can give the boys the thrill of their young lives by stimulating support for this tournament. An organized send-off for the team cars traveling together, parents encouraged to come, all these are small arrangements and events to adults, but they'll be as big as the Stanley Cup playoffs to the boys. The registration fee is \$10 per team and the closing registration date is Saturday 15th, 1960. Official entry forms and detailed particulars may be obtained now, on request to "Brampton Novice Hockey Week," Box 101, Brampton, Ontario.

It is hoped to see your team and a retinue of parents in Brampton during "Novice Hockey Week."
