School Trustees Chairman Gives Aspects Of School Management

Annual initiation ceremonies and dinner for the men of Holy Cross Parish, Holy Name Society were climaxed with an informal review of some aspects of school management by Chester McLarg, Chairman of the School Trustees Association of Ontario. Following the initiation ceremonies which witnessed the formal enrollment of several new members, the Catholic Women's League served a turkey dinner. Immediately afterwards, Mr. R. Hunt, Vice-President of the Holy Name Society and dinner Chairman, welcomed the guests and made some brief remarks covering current business, in the place of Mr. A. Norris, the President, who could not attend owing to a family loss. Mr. T. Fitzmaurice, Principal of Holy Cross School was congenially given the floor and presented a comprehensive introduction of the speaker.

Various Roles

Mr. C. McLarg of Hamilton has served for many years in various roles of education. In particular he has been active as an executive of the School Trustees Association of Ontario and has devoted much of his time to the work of the Trustees Council. He has in fact, been considered one of the most noted educators in Ontario.

Brampton Holstein Sets World Milk Record

A pure bred Holstein heifer, owned by Johnson Brothers, of Brampton, has established a World Record for milk production. She did this despite calving with twins to start her championship lactation and then calving again with a single calf just 325 days later. The new Champion is named Johnson Perfect Ann. She made her record of 22,677 lbs. milk and 698 lbs. fat in 305 days on twice-a-day milking. The former World Champion for milk in this class was another Canadian Holstein, Regasborne Alice Alcatraz, who established her record of 22,227 lbs. of milk ten years ago in the herd of Osborne I. Sager, St. George, Ontario. Ann's World record has a Bred Class Average of 217 per cent, or in other words it is over twice as large as the average record made by an average Holstein in Canada in her class. Ann's sire is Rosale Perfect, who was jointly owned by Johnson Brothers, D. S. Dunton & Sons, Brampton, and W. H. McCaugherty, Streetsville, until his recent sale to the Hamilton and District Cattle Breeding Association, Hamilton, Ontario, where he will be used in the artificial breeding stud. Ann is not the only one of his daughters to produce sensationally, ten of them in the Johnson herd averaging over 14,000 lbs. as two-year-olds and better than 18,000 lbs. as three-year-olds, all in 305 days on twice-a-day milking.

FARM NEWS DR. D. A. BARNUM ADDRESSES HALTON HOLSTEIN BREEDERS. J.A.F. Dr. D. A. Barnum of the Ontario Veterinary College, was the guest speaker at the Halton Holstein Club annual meeting held at Palerup on Thursday, January 14th. In his remarks Dr. Barnum outlined the methods of control so far as Mastitis is concerned. He stated that more research on Bovine Mastitis is required, and that probably in the '60s we would see considerable research on the disease. His address stressed management practices on the part of the dairy farmer, in the control of the disease. Following his remarks the members had an opportunity of having questions answered by Dr. Barnum. During the business session in the morning under the chairmanship of Wm. Towell, President, several reports of yearling activities were presented. Secretary Treasurer John W. Pickett outlined the year's activities. Assistant Agricultural Representative D. E. Jackson presented a report on Halton's 4th Holstein Calf Club. National Directors Ross Neesworth and D. Dunton presented reports. In the Sales Agent's report, by Martin Hestlop, he noted that the average price for Holsteins in the county this year was higher than the previous year. Holstein fieldman Geo. Drenth commented on the activities of field staff, and outlined some of the problems in carrying on Association work. The election of officers saw the following elected: President, J. H.
