Mr. Mellarg suggested that as an expedient towards more afficient meetings, copies of the minutes could also . A. he sent to the board members. This would save the time required for reading the minutes at! the official meetings.

In conducting the meetings, it was strongly recommended that as a point of order all remarks he addressed to the chair. It is a most effective way of avoiding personal disputes. In addition, motions should be written and signed by both mover and seconder, so that at a future date if an issue should arise there will be no operation of the-proceedings.


