At the second meeting of the Club, held on Thursday evening, January 21st, Mr. R. Cunningham discussed shelter belts and windbreaks; the handling of trees for planting; and various planting methods.

As a project the Club Member will establish a plantation, or shelterbelt, or mark the farm woodlot for management practices.
