A first war veteran, Robert Preece, 75, died on January 16 in Milton. He was the father of Mrs. Murray Bridgen, Hornby, and had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Bridgen for the past five years.

Mr. Preece was born in Herefordshire, England in 1885. He served under Lord Allenby with the 53rd Division, 1st Hereford Regiment and then a year in France during World War I. Married in 1912 to Elizabeth Evans, they came to Canada with their family in 1927, settling in the Brampton district. They moved to Bond Head in 1934 where Mrs. Preece died in 1951.

He leaves his daughter Elizabeth (Mrs. Bridgen), four sons, Albert of White Horse, Yukon; Herbert of Toronto; Arthur and John of Newmarket; eight grandchildren; and two brothers, Charles Preece of Brockenhurst, Wales and John Preece, Manchester, England.

Rev. John Hill of Hornby United Church conducted the funeral service on January 19th at the home of his daughter, and interment was made in Bond Head Cemetery. Pall-bearers were six neighbours, John McLean, Edward Ilpwell, Wilbert Orr, William Sutherland, Clifford Whiteside and Harry Reynolds.

Robert Preece Was Veteran Of First War

A sister-in-law of Mrs. Abbie McClure, 52 Main St. S., Mrs. George McClure, 60, died in Vancouver, B.C. on Christmas day.

Born Ada Archibald, in King Township, York County, she moved with her family to Red Deer, Alberta in 1890. Following their marriage in 1914, Mr. & Mrs. McClure lived there for four years, then at Okotoks, and in 1942 moved to Vancouver.

She had been a member of Okotoks Women's Institute and the Ladies Aid of the United Church. Surviving are her husband, two sons, Herbert of Edmonton and Orville of Okotoks, two daughters, Mrs. J. Cowden of Vancouver and Mrs. W. Funeral services were conducted in Okotoks United Church with Rev. E. B. Brumage officiating. Interment was in Camrose.

The Book of Job. Three short films were shown by Mr. Allen on Saturday night, Jan. 23rd. The first film Aye Follow Your Own described the perspectives that beset a Scottish family trying to decide whether they should remain in the security of their Scottish homes or the banks of the Clyde or emigrate to Canada. The second film, Treasure of the Forest, depicted the process by which our Canadian timber is turned into pulpwood for the manufacture of newsprint, Canada's largest single export, lumber for furniture and other products made from wood. The third film, Land of Bubbling Waters, was a colour film and showed scenes at Radipon Hot Springs, Jasper and Banff National Parks and other localities famous for their mineral springs.

Rev. J. L. Graham, minister of St. Paul's United Church, Milton, conducted the services on Sunday afternoon Jan. 24th reading the first chapter of the First Epistle of John as the scripture lesson. Mr. Graham spoke on the subject, Helps in spiritual living. He spoke first about the reading of religious books and the practice of religious observances, such as the days of the blessing before meals. He stressed particularly, however, the importance of quiet time with God to be spent in the reading of the Bible, in prayer and in meditation. All these things are of great spiritual help in this age of change, speed and materialism.
