A first war veteran, Robert Precce, 75, died on January 16 in Milton. He was the father of Mrs. Murray Bridgen, Hornby, and had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Bridgen for the past five years. Mr. Precce was born in Herefordshire, England in 1885. He served under Lord Allenby with the 53rd Division, 1st Hereford Regiment and then a year in France during World War I. Married in 1912 to Elizabeth Evans, they came to Canada with their family in 1927, settling in the Brampton district. They moved to Bond Head in 1934 where Mrs. Precce died in 1957. He leaves his daughter Elizabeth (Mrs. Bridgen), four sons, Albert of White Horse, Yukon, Herbert of Toronto, Arthur and John of Newmarket; eight grandchildren; and two brothers Charles Precce of Brockenshire, Wales and John Precce, Manchester, England.
