More Industrial Land For Moore Subdivision, Council Says

Suggesting that land allocated for industrial use is not extensive enough, council on Monday returned the Moore farm subdivision to the town Planning Board for further study.

Recently council received a recommendation from the planning board which would amend Georgetown's official plan to rezone the farm into commercial, residential and industrial land.

At last week's meeting, the matter was turned over to council's industrial committee which, in turn, invited other council members and planning board chairman Claude Kentner to a committee meeting. Reporting Monday on the meeting results, committee chairman Ian Cass said opinion was that an original plan which designated more industrial land was more acceptable. The first plan had been turned down by the Ontario Dept. of Planning & Development which claims Georgetown already has too large a percentage of industrially planned land.

Representing the land developers, Harold Fobert spoke at the meeting, explaining that the rezoning has been underway for over a year, and that he cannot understand further delay.

Mr. Fobert quoted from a letter received in March, 1959 from the Dept. of Planning, which said the town has 850 industrial acres and allowing 30 workers per acre, has a potential employee force of 18,000. Statistics show that one-eighth of a population in engaged in manufacturing which would allow a population of 120,000. With town population 20 years from now estimated to be some 20,000, the Dept. concluded that industrial land is more than needed.

Mayor Hyde said he thought the land developers had "put the cart before the horse" in approaching the Dept. before going to the town planning board. If Georgetown has enough industrial land for a city of 120,000, the original zoning was wrong, he said, but even so, it

WHAY COUNCIL DID

Police Chief Suggests Second Cruiser, 2 Men

A recommendation that two more police officers be added to the town force, and one more when Georgetown reaches 10,000 population was made to council Monday by Police Chief Haley.

Mr. Haley also suggested that a second police cruiser be purchased; or that the present cruiser be sold and two smaller ones purchased. A radar timer was another item on his suggestion list, consideration of a pension plan for policemen; elevation of Cpl. Bilistrow to sergeant, Cpl. Rankine to 1st class constable, and a salary increase for himself.

The police committee, headed by Cr. Kelly, was delegated to study the requests, as well as another concerning salaries and working conditions presented on behalf of the police association by Cpl. Bilistrow.

Jack Armstrong, representing the Mutual Life firm, asked permission to submit a proposed pension plan for municipal employees.

Mayor Hyde, who favoured an administration committee decision on having such a brief prepared, was overruled in a narrow vote which showed a majority in favour of allowing the company to prepare such data.

Asking for a council merchant get-together to discuss a proposal by downtown businessmen for a parking lot which would be paid for by assessing extra taxes on business properties, Paul Barber was told that council's property committee would act for the town in such a discussion.
