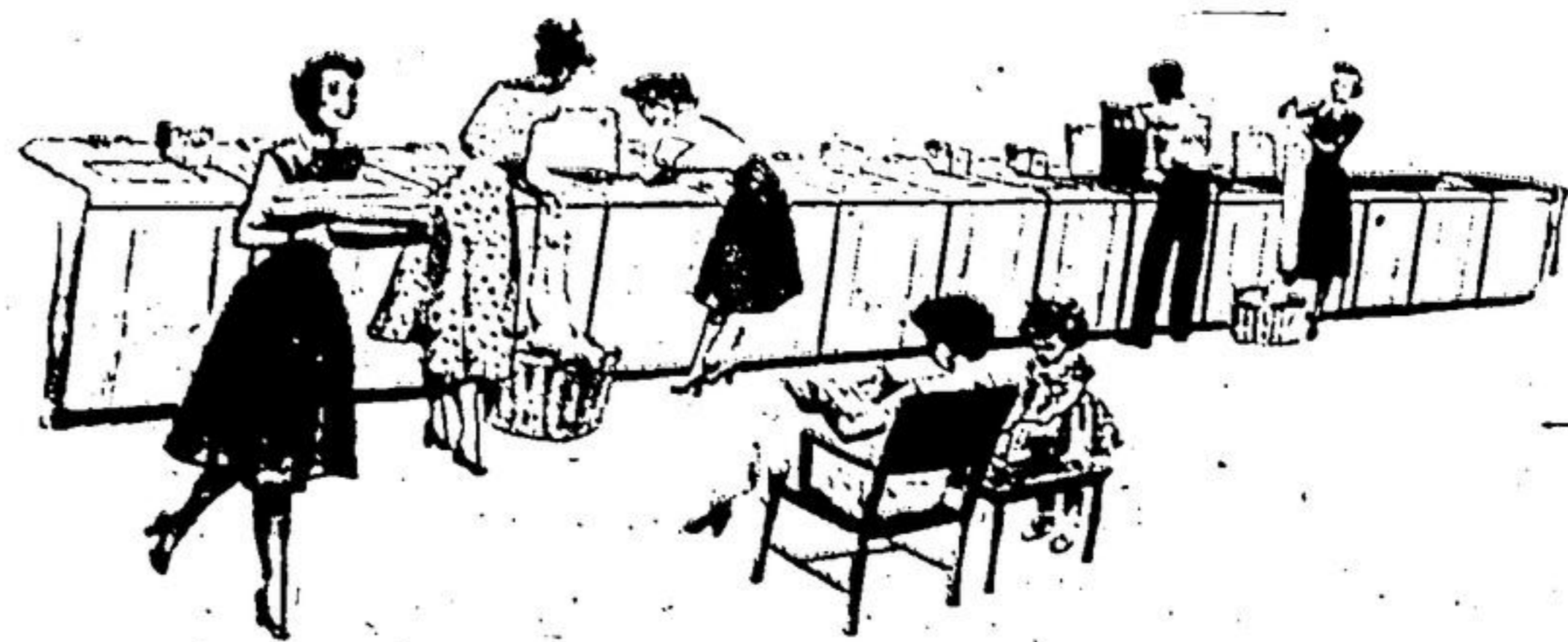

• BARRAGER'S CLEANERS who started operations here in 1946 on July 1st apparently adopted that date as some kind of motto for they've been producing it ever since.

• Their latest, a coin operated Laundromat, will open on Guelph Street on Saturday. To be known as Barrager's Speed Wash, the new business is located in a completely remodelled section of their present Guelph St. branch where the more than ample parking space can accommodate some 50 cars.

• The Speed Wash makes available to local housewives the luxury of twenty modern automatic washers and seven latest model gas dryers plus the benefits of soft water conditioned by Zeolite water softener. The first of its kind in town, the Speed Wash will be open six days a week and an attendant will be on hand during the afternoons.

• From its original premises in the former Barchin Cleaners and Barber's Gift Shop stores on Main Street North, the Barrager cleaning office was moved to its present spot as a Herald neighbour after ten successful years of operation in 1956, the larger area making it possible to combine the office with the cleaning plant which until that time was housed in a cement block building on the J. J. Gibbons property behind Corner Cupboard Restaurant.

• The new location in 1956 incorporated the 1st synthetic two bath plant. Prior to that the Barrager customers had their garments treated in the first petroleum cleaning plant in town. The Guelph St. branch was opened in 1957.

• The Barrager expansion story is reflected in their staff which in 1946 comprised Don and his wife Doris and now numbers ten.
