Mayor Hyde reiterated that the report pertains to no present council business and that while he is prepared to discuss it privately with any ratepayer, it should not be discussed at a council meeting.
 Cr. Kelly said that if council is paying a \$1,000 account for the report citizens are entitled to know what they got for their money.
 "Mr. Beard has said there were strong feelings among some people during election time, and those people are liable to feel there's something in the report we don't want known. I've read the report and I know every figure is accurate but there is some information it doesn't give that I'd like to know," he stated.
 Cr. Harrison then asked for a review of two motions about the report made at meetings in November, and these were read by the mayor. The first, passed unanimously, empowered the finance committee to seek a report. The second, a week later, was opposed by Hyde, Harrison and Elliott in engaging Lever & Hutkin to compile a report by Dec. 31st at a fee of not more than \$1,000. "The amount of money and the date had a bearing on my voting against it," said Cr. Harrison.

Cr. Cass said he had had no hand in asking for the report, thinks it will solve none of the town's fundamental problems, but thinks it should be made readily available to the public.
 "The report says nothing, although it's been suggested it says a great deal," said the mayor.
 Deputy Reeve Gray said tax money is paying for it and there are some things he would like explained more fully.
 "You suggest people haven't time to go to the clerk's office to read it, yet you want to spend council time discussing it," said Mayor Hyde. "A great many things are paid out of current revenue without a council discussion."
