Winter Visitors Increase At Conservation Parks

In 1959 a total of 774,960 persons visited conservation areas administered by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, it was revealed last week in a staff report to the Executive Committee.

This total is well over twice the number of visitors in 1958, which was 319,176.

The report also noted that the six conservation areas were showing a notable increase in the number of persons using them during the winter months. Heart Lake and Albion Hills areas are popular for skating, skiing and tobogganing.

Other projects contained in the report included the following:

Construction of the final two acres in the lower Humber is presently underway and it is expected that all of the river improvement will be completed early in the spring.

The channel improvements on the Don River at York Mills and the bridge over Donnie Avenue are 80 per cent completed. The project will be finished in about one month and it is expected that development of the area for recreation purposes will be commenced early in the Spring by the Metro Parks Dept.

The scheme for development of a conservation area on the west branch of the Don river from Eglinton Avenue north to Lawrence Ave. has been approved by the Dept. of Planning and Development, and a survey

is presently being made of the lands lying south of Eglinton Ave. Upon completion of the survey, a plan of expropriation will be filed.

The MTRCA's tree planting operations during 1959 showed that a total of 355,500 trees were planted, 295,000 of them on private lands and 60,500 on Authority properties. During the past three years, the Authority has planted a total of 456,000 trees, and it is anticipated that the 1960 program will see an additional 472,500 planted.

Under the Authority's farm pond assistance program, the MTRCA has engineered 427 ponds during the last three years and has paid out subsidies for 119 ponds.

4-H Club Leaders are Guests at Luncheon

The Halton 4-H Club Leaders Council, made up of volunteer leaders interested in 4-H club work, met in the Board Room of the Extension branch, Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, Milton on Wednesday, February 3.

The leaders were guests of the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture for a luncheon held at the Milton Inn.

4-H club work is directed by the Extension Branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, a tractor club, a potato club and a swim club.

4-H Club Work in the Province has doubled in the last ten years and in planning the expansion program for Halton County it was decided that a Call Club be started in the Acton, Nassauville area. The organization meetings for all clubs will be held in Milton, on Saturday, April 2nd.

The three judging competitions Livestock, Seed and Land Judging - will be held this year, as well as a Parents' Night, which in 1959 took the form of a Safety Meeting.

Any new members interested in joining a 4-H Club in 1960 should contact the office of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, before April 1st.

Plan Four New Postage Stamps For 1960 Issue

At least five new postage stamps will make their appearance during 1960, according to an announcement made by the Hon. William Hamilton, postmaster general. The familiar blue aerogramme form for overseas air letters is also to be completely redesigned.

The regular issue postage stamps portraying Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth will be replaced with new designs and it is expected that at least two of the denominations of the new series will be issued in 1960. While the designing of this new issue has not yet begun, some sweeping changes are receiving serious consideration. The stamps are to be the same small size as the present issue but may possibly be turned so that the long dimension is horizontal. Her Majesty's portrait will appear, but will not occupy the entire area of the design as at present.

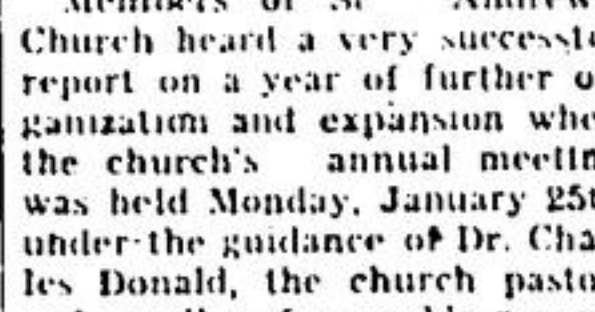
