

### Firemen Parade In Uniform Honour Fire Chief Harlow

Firemen, in dress uniforms, paid tribute to Georgetown's fire chief last Wednesday when they attended a funeral service in St. George's Anglican Church for John Oliver (Jack) Harlow, 40.

Recently elected to his fourth term as chief, Mr. Harlow suffered a heart attack the previous week while en route to investigate a possible fire. He died in Guelph General Hospital on February 7th.

Employed for 19 years in the shipping department at South & Stone, Ltd., Mr. Harlow had devoted a similar number of years to his duties as a fire department member. He was also chief of the plant fire brigade at South & Stone, and acted as assistant to the Ontario Fire Marshal for Georgetown and Esqueping. He was a member of the North Hants Club and was interested in deer hunting, joining a party which went north each fall.

Born in Hinton, he lived in Norwich also before moving to Georgetown 28 years ago. He leaves his wife, the former Margaret Bruce, a daughter Jacqueline and a son Gordon.

A grandson, Thomas Dobbie, who is a constable with the RCMP in Winnipeg, and five nephews, Allan and Roy Norton, Herman, Chester and Lawrence Cole, were pallbearers at the funeral service on Saturday for Mrs. Thomas Dobbie. The service was conducted at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home by Rev. Morgan McFarlane. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Mrs. Dobbie, the former Jennie Sutherland, was a native of Ennisdale, daughter of the late William and Susan Sutherland. She died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, on Feb. 10th.

Mr. and Mrs. Dobbie lived in Georgetown following their marriage, then in Valleyfield, Quebec, from 1923 to 1938, returning to Georgetown where they had since resided.

Predeceased by her husband and by one daughter, Elva May, she leaves three children, Mrs. O. ### W. H. (Tiny) Merry Dies Shorthorn Showman

Well known locally as a Shorthorn cattle showman at Georgetown Fair, W. Harland (Tiny) Merry, 53, died Thursday of a heart attack at his home near Milton.

He was a director of the Royal Winter Fair and the Canadian Shorthorn Association, and was also a leading breeder of homing pigeons and pedigree dogs. His prize Shorthorn herd included a steer which won the Queen's Guineas at the Winter Fair. Three months ago he won the championship at the Chicago International cattle show.

Mr. Merry was educated at Appleby College and the Ontario Agricultural College, then entered his father's printing ink business and became president of Charles Bush Ltd. in 1943.

He leaves his wife, Eileen Jarvis, one son, Robert of Milton; three daughters, Mrs. Richard Farley of Edmonton, Mrs. Ralph Hills of Ennisdale, and Katherine of Milton, also brothers and sisters, Richard of Caledon, Herbert of Oakville, and Mrs. Geoffrey Bide of London, England.

Funeral service took place in St. Paul's United Church, Milton, on Saturday, with interment in Oakville Cemetery.
