The man who bumped Bradford off the OHA Intermediate ladder last season in the mad scramble for the league title returned to haunt them Friday night and stuck around Saturday to chase them out of the central Ontario Intermediate League semi-finals. Jack "Rabbit" Rhodes, sudden thrust into the Raiders nets on an untimely virus hospitalization, was simultaneously thrust into a hero's role.

Bradford owned a 3-2 lead at the end of two on tallies by Dunne from Gibson at 6:52 and Stuthers from Cashburn and Patton at 19:22 after Blake Inglis notched Georgetown's second one from Dave Voyer and Gerry Inglis at 13:27. The third frame belonged to the Raiders, Jamie Cunningham from Irons at 3:1, George Gray from Thompson at 9:50 and Dave Irons on a solo effort at 12:13 did all the scoring and but for erratic shooting the outcome could have been a lot more one-sided.

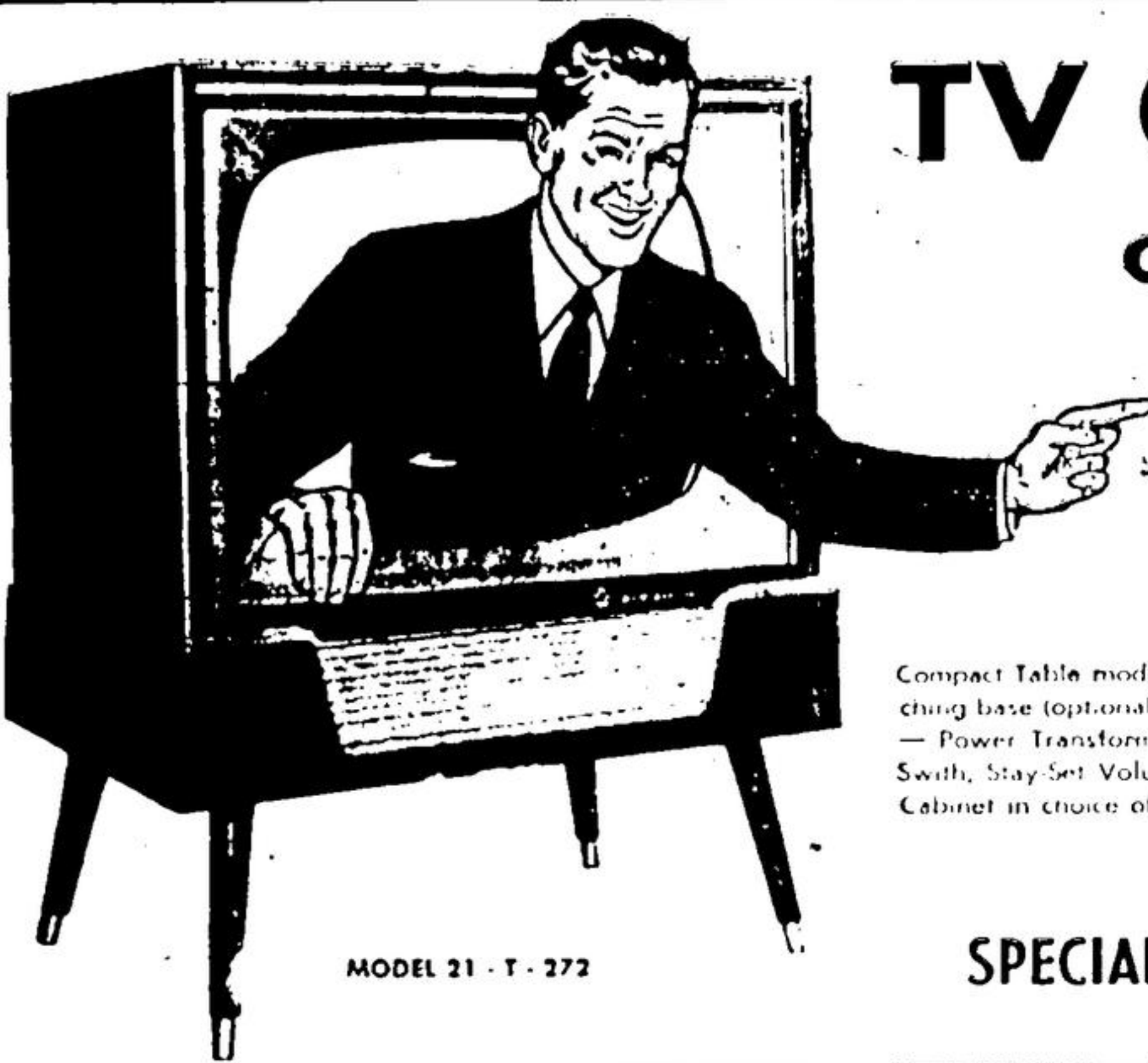
BUCKEYE BEAUT

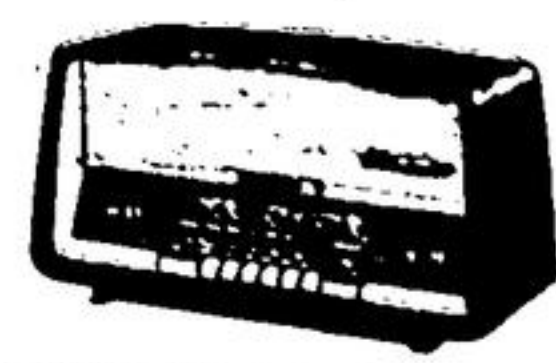

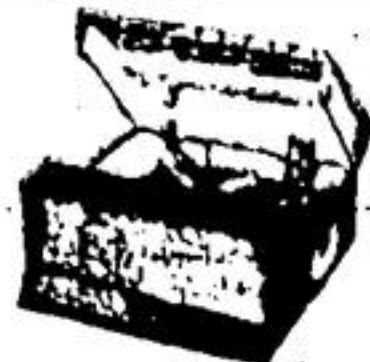
