J. M. Denyes, 87 Was Once Halton Inspector

Well remembered by older generations of Georgetown when he was public school Inspector, James Malcolm Denyes, 87, died in Toronto last Tuesday. He was succeeded when he retired some years ago by L. L. Skuce.

Born at Odessa, Mr. Denyes was a graduate of Queen's University. He devoted his working life to education, first as a teacher and then as principal of Newburg, Whitchurch and Oakville high schools, and finally as school inspector in Halton.

The J. M. Denyes public school in Milton was named in his honour.

He leaves his wife, Mary Bruce Meacham, and three daughters, Mrs. A. J. Mylrea, Mrs. W. W. King and Dorothy Dunbar Denyes, all of Burlington. Only son, Meacham, was killed in France in the first world war.

Funeral service was held on Friday at the Trill Funeral Home, Toronto, with interment in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton, later that day.
