

# PLAY-OFF SERIES STARTS FOR RAIDERS FRIDAY IN MILTON

Georgetown Raiders and Milton Merchants lock horns in the first game of the OHA Intermediate A playoffs. The rest of the best of seven series schedule has yet to be announced.

The Raiders and Merchants wound up their two game total goals series for the Tom O'Neil trophy and league title last night here too late for press coverage.

Milton led 6 goals to 4 at the end of the first half of the two part final at their home base last Wednesday night.

By avoiding the Friday night rain, the Raiders had left for the Greenstuffs after their butt end and elbow treatment of Raider lightweight Cunningham, Richardson and Thompson in the opener. But they also gained by their absence - a \$91 attended bill from the local club.

That was the postponement cost in ice time, advertising, and refreshment fees.

OHA official Ed Hodgson had already arrived from Toronto to call the game and was surprised to learn that Milton had bowed to the weather. Raider club secretary, Art McAllister and a couple of players did some touring on their own after the postponement came thru from Milton late Friday after-

noon and the results were embarrassing to the county town.

Traffic was moving without difficulty on the 7th Lane to Hornby and between Hornby and Milton. Alternate routes, Highway 25 to Acton and to town via No. 7, and Highway 401 to Brampton and to town via No. 7, had been snow cleared by the Department of Highways. The Milton call claimed all roads were impassable.

Whether the fact that a couple of their stalwarts would be manning the plows while the rest of the club was doing battle had any bearing on the Milton decision to call it off - Minus Bob Demerse, Dave Voyce, Dave Irons, and Roy Layben, the Raiders showed no signs of their lack of bench strength in the first period Wednesday when they went into a 3-1 lead on tallies by Blake Inglis from Dixon at 9:18, again from Junior Beumant at 14:12, and Ron Dixon from Cunningham and Thompson at 19:24. Peterson scored from Murray Greenke and Ed Haslett at 13:48.

The silent Milton crowd came to life in the second frame when Jack Price counted a pair, from Stu Hannant at 1:07 and from Sammy Mulholland at 11:07, sandwiching a tally by Hannant from Joe McAnn at 7:24. Doug Richardson untangled himself from Hodlar's stick long enough to contribute the Raiders 4th goal at 18:50.

Jack Roberts beat Rhodes on a solo effort at 3:13 of the one side finale and Mulholland out raged Bill Chard to the puck to count number 6 and that one had a flavour all its own in the dying seconds.

Georgetown drew 9 penalties to Milton's 10.

The meeting was closed with the Benediction given by Rev. Kenneth Richardson, who complimented the ladies on their forward progressive inward and outward as they prepared to make the Lenten season one of edification.
