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## Father Was Partner In Harley-Kay Knitting Firm

A former employee of the Harley-Kay Knitting Co. here, in which his father held partnership, Adam Kay died on Friday, February 26 at Moorefield, Ontario. He was 74.  
Born in Georgetown, the son of Adam Kay Sr. and Elizabeth Fordyce, he attended school here before taking employment at the knitting machine company on Water St. and later with Hissels of Elora. He served three years overseas with the IAF and held membership to the Georgetown and Elora branches of the Canadian Legion.  
Mr. and Mrs. Kay, the former Margaret McKee, were married in Hamilton. Two sons, Ronald Adam and John Fordyce live at Elora and Moorefield respectively, however, another son, William James was killed in Feb., 1945, while serving with the Canadian Army. He was also predeceased by sisters Rose Jeanne, Calgary, Bessie Cole, Georgetown and a brother William of Georgetown.  
Besides his wife and two sons, he is survived by five grand children, John, Robert, Ronald, Janet and Douglas.  
The funeral service was held at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith St. on Monday, February 29th and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Rev. Alex Calder of Knox Presbyterian Church conducted the service and the pallbearers were Dave Bowman, Henry Shepherd, Robert H. Oley, Jack Crawford, Jim Coffell and Ken DeLose.

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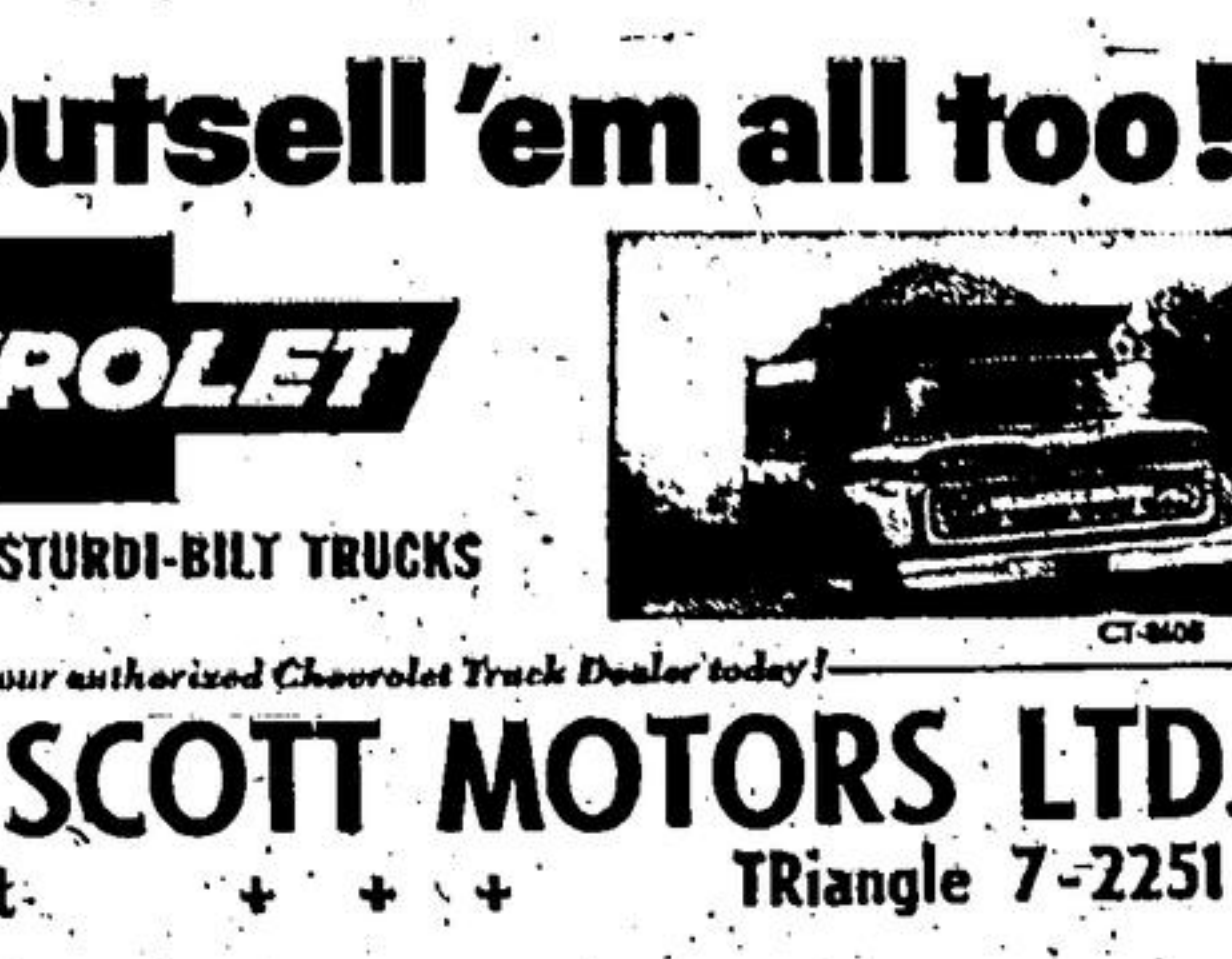


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**LADIES DO THEIR PART!**

## Former Norval School Principal Celebrates Golden Wedding

A principal at Norval Public School from 1902 to 1906, Mrs. Anna Harber and now Mrs. Henry Loyns, celebrated her Golden Wedding anniversary last month at her home at Nacaim, Saskatchewan, near Melfort. She graduated from Georgetown High School in 1902.  
A description of an evening in honour of the happy couple in Nacaim Community Hall was reported in the Melfort Journal and forwarded to the Herald. "1910-1960, Henry and Anna," were the words inscribed in gold on our dainty napkins that happy evening in Nacaim Community Hall.  
Yes, that day, January 26th, marked the Golden Wedding Anniversary of our much loved and respected pioneer couple, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Loyns. They entered the hall to the strains of the Wedding March. As they happily moved down the centre aisle preceded by two charming little flower girl granddaughters, Lorraine Fisher and June Loyns, their many friends sang out heartily, "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." Our honored couple were presented with a corsage of roses for Anna and a ray boutonniere for Henry, by their good friends, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Nelson. The Golden Wedding celebration had begun.  
Mr. Len Smith entered for the occasion with his usual jovial wit and good nature. He read telegram of good wishes and congratulations from His Excellency, the Governor General and Madame Vanier, the Rt. Hon. John Diefenbaker, Prime Minister of Canada, the Hon. T. C. Douglas, Premier of Saskatchewan, Mr. R. Hopp, M.P., Mr. C. G. Willis, M.A., Rev. and Mrs. J. M. Hyatt, Estevan, Mrs. Sally Nicholas, Searsdale, New York, Mr. and Mrs. O. Barroas, Winnipeg, Mr. Irwin Loyns, Miami, Man, Mrs. Armatage, Calgary, Alta., Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Lambert, Salford, Alta., Mr. Wm. Hutrows, Winnipeg.  
Also a letter of congratulatory tone was received from Mr. Robert Ramsay of the University of Sask., recalling the early days when Mr. Henry Loyns was leader of the first Swim Club in this area.  
Mrs. Loyns settled on the prairie homestead with her young husband, and soon became pioneer teacher in three of our local schools. - Dunbar, one of the large Nacaim public schools, Lee Vert and Lewis Lake schools.  
The roll was called by Mr. Brenna, and many of her original pupils were proud of her and glad to stand and answer "Present, Teacher." The audience joined in a lusty "School Days", while Mrs. Loyns, smilingly over her memories of these hectic hours and busy days so long ago.  
Many local organizations and friends joined in relating Mr. and Mrs. Loyns' story from their wedding in 1910 to the present.

**Postage Stamp Honours Golden Jubilee Of Guides**  
A commemorative postage stamp will be issued on April 20th, 1960, in celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Girl Guides movement in Canada. It was announced today by the Hon. William Hamilton, Postmaster General.  
The design of the new two colour five cent stamp will include a "trefoil" on a blue background flanked by the words "Girl Guides Association" in English and French and the dates "1910-1960" in gold lettering. The trefoil, a three lobed leaf, is the badge of the Association.  
The new stamp is the work of Canadian artist, Helen Fitzgerald, of Toronto who designed the "Associated Country Women of the World" stamp issued in 1959.  
The Girl Guides Association was organized in 1909 in Great Britain by Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of the Boy Scouts. Within a year the movement was established in Canada, the first company being formed in St. Catharines, Ontario.  
Soon other companies were in operation in Ontario and within a short time the Association had spread throughout the other provinces. In 1912 a Dominion Council was set up and five years later the Canadian Council of the Girl Guides Association was incorporated.  
Canada now has the third largest Guide population in the world, being exceeded only by Great Britain and the United States. The Canadian Guides claim another unique distinction in that they have the best northerly company in the world. The Algonic, NWY group was founded in 1937 and was the first of the far north groups, some of which have Eskimo members.  
The ideals of good citizenship and the establishment and maintenance of friendly international relations promoted by the Guides have been emphasized at three national and one world camp held in Canada. The first national camp was at Victoria in 1928, and the second at Itaska, N.B. in 1939. In 1952, a thousand Canadian girls and their guests from countries of the Western Hemisphere enjoyed camping together at Ottawa.  
One of four world camps in celebration of the centenary of the birth of Lord Baden Powell was held in Canada in 1957 at Doe Lake, Ont. with representatives of many countries among the hundreds of girls in attendance.  
An interesting link between the Girl Guides and the Canada Post Office is the postal badge earned by Guides who demonstrate a knowledge of good mailing practices. The Guides' cooperation is mutually advantageous as proper addressing and packaging of mail matter permits prompt and efficient handling by the Post Office.  
In announcing the new stamp the postmaster general said the issue is a tribute to all who have encouraged and assisted the Association and to the thousands of Canadian girls who have benefited from its character-building activities.

**FARM NEWS**  
Prof. Stone To Speak At Halton Crops Day

Prof. J. B. Stone, of the Animal Husbandry Department, Ontario Agricultural College, will be the feature speaker at the annual Halton Crop Day and Hay Show, Fair Grounds, Milton, on Thursday, March 17th. Prof. Stone will discuss the feeding costs of Hay and Silage under different methods of harvesting.  
The time of cutting, and method of handling, causes a difference in the feeding value of hay and silage. Forage is one of Halton's most important crops, and many farmers will be interested in this discussion. In the Hay Show section of the Crops Day new classes have been added. The new classes provide for exhibitors who have used hay conditioners in their haying operations.  
Reports indicate that this year's competition should be keen.

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
