Saves Car in Garage Fire on Ontario St. A garage on the property of Mark Stufko, 17 Ontario St., was damaged by fire Monday when a stove set up inside to melt an accumulation of ice overheated. More Police Protection Sought For Hockey Tilts

More police protection at hockey games was used by many groups, he said, and he thinks they should be financed privately. The request still rests in the hands of Cr. Hunter's recreation committee which has not yet made a recommendation to council on the request.

Cr. Harrison, who is also a hockey club official, said that the club had dropped its policy of paying off-duty men for such protection this year. "Last year we paid \$8 per man for policing," said Cr. Hunter.

Police chairman Kelly said the police chief had told him that his men are instructed to visit the arena during their duty rounds, but not to stay there to the detriment of other parts of town.

"The arena isn't known as a hot spot," Kelly said. "It's a place where people go to have fun. It's not a place where you would expect to find a lot of trouble. The police are always on duty at all hockey games. It's always on duty for fireworks when the fire department is directing traffic at busy times downtown and hockey games should be included in such special duties."

Million Dollar Gift To Canadian Schools. Nearly 500 Ontario high schools will share an unprecedented million-dollar gift to Canadian education announced recently by Charles E. Simms, Federation president of the Canadian School Trustees' Association.

The gift is being made by Encyclopaedia Britannica of Canada Ltd. Terminating the donation of a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica to every qualified high school in Canada. The latest single contribution ever made in secondary education in this country, Mr. Simms said that over the next few weeks more than 1600 sets of the latest edition of the authoritative Britannica would be going in to the libraries of English speaking high schools including private schools from coast to coast.

Later, sets will be presented to those French speaking schools which would like to have it. The sets will be presented by the chairman of local school boards or equivalent bodies. Presentations will be made in metropolitan centres in the name of the person deemed to have done most for the community.

The sheer logistics of the gift are breathtaking. Mr. Simms told a meeting of leading educators and press representatives. "Since the sets are to be replaced on a regular basis, the total value of the donation is well over one million dollars. More than one thousand local school boards are involved in presentations to the 1600-odd schools with a total enrollment of an estimated 650,000 pupils."
