

**Was Royal Bank  
Manager, Charles  
McIntosh Dies**

Charles "Chad" McIntosh, retired Royal Bank manager and former lieutenant-governor of the Kiwanis Clubs of Western Canada, was interred in Burgessville Cemetery, Sunday, Feb. 20th after funeral service in Toronto. He was the brother of Mrs. Gerald McCallum, Durham St.

Mr. McIntosh died of a heart ailment at his home on Randolph Rd., Leaside on Friday. He was 72.

Born in Point Edward, he received his early education in Port Rowan and Tillsonburg. He started in business in 1904

with the Western Bank in Tillsonburg and later was manager of the Farmer's Bank in the Burgessville area.

He served as bank manager of Royal Bank branches at Hanley, Yorktown, and Moose Jaw in Saskatchewan and in 1925 he went to the Prince Albert branch where he remained until his retirement in 1947.

**Award Contract For  
New Town Water Well**

One of three proposals submitted for construction of a third water well, the tender of C. H. Rutledge was accepted Monday by council.

The firm will receive a maximum price of \$25,000 for the job which includes test drilling in a location near the town's present water supply.

At the same time, council ordered a construction by-law prepared for the well, which with pump-house is estimated to cost \$42,000, and sought permission from Ontario Municipal Improvement Corporation to purchase the debentures which the town will issue for the project.

A \$200 subsidy was voted to the Community Centre Association, to help defray a deficit incurred in its sports operations last season.

A resident of Georgetown and district for almost 35 years, Mrs. Emma Middleton Cousens died on February 26 in Brighton, England, where she had been living since early 1950 with a sister.

Mrs. Cousens was born in London, England, the daughter of Henry Middleton and Mary Healey and attended school there. On August 12th, 1925 she married Gordon Cousens and immediately after their marriage came to Canada living first in Barrie for a year before moving here. Lt. Col. Cousens predeceased his wife three years ago.
