## Seek Permission to Sell Sunbeam 5% Park Lots

Offer of Zuber Homes to purchase five building lots on Shelley and Byron streets, sparked a discussion at Monday's council meeting. The council's decision led to a request to the Dept. of Planning & Development for permission to sell the properties. The land was part of a 5% allocation for parks, which the government requires be decided by a subdivider, and has been unused since Sunbeam Heights came into being, other than for a winter skating rink last season. Council can take no action until the government okays it, and it is likely that if this happens, the properties will be offered for sale by tender. Meanwhile, Reeve Doug Sargent spoke against any sale, saying the land would have future use as "parkettes". Cr. Harrison had an opposite opinion, claiming the lots are

not large enough for any organized recreation, and are catch-alls for junk money parked from their sale could be better used in other town parks, he said. "Money from that area should go back into that area," Cr. Elliott's opinion was. Mayor Hyde said the discussion brought up the point of a council's responsibility in accepting the 5% land from subdividers and that more attention should be paid, so a town does not end up with a number of small parcels of property. "I've yet to see the 5% we are to get from Delrex," remarked Cr. Harrison. "I was properly chairman for two years and requested to know where the land deed is on several occasions, but I never found any land deeded other than for schools." Reeve Sargent was the lone opponent when the vote was taken.

Town employee Wm. J. Wallinger was appointed weed inspector again this year at a fee of \$100. Cr. William Hunter will represent council on the Community Centre subcommittee. Filing a request from Kitchener council to ask for larger government grants for public libraries, Mayor Hyde said this was more a matter for the Mayors and Reeves association. "We shouldn't petition the government every time someone gets an idea," he said. "Agreeing with tabling this request, Cr. Ian Cass said he would have to see this become a general principle of council and that each request should be considered on its merits. "From what I've been reading in the papers, there haven't been enough members sitting at Queen's Park to deal with any questions lately," contributed Cr. Harrison.

## HOSPITAL DONATIONS EXCEED \$125,000, HALF-WAY MARK

A district fund campaign to raise \$250,000 for Georgetown's new million dollar hospital has passed the halfway mark. Latest reports show that over \$125,000 has been subscribed to cash and pledges. Clubs and organizations account for \$51,000 of the total and the personal gifts section has registered almost \$30,000 to date. Other divisions include special corporations, \$7,500; doctors, \$12,950; employees, \$15,500. In a town residential canvass presently underway, \$5500 was reported at a Monday night meeting, while a similar campaign in the rural district has turned in \$2,000. Among donors to date are: Mr. D.
