BANTAMS

Georgetown 8 - Acton 3
Jack Gudgeon notched three goals to pace his club to the opening 3-2 win over Acton. Liddell's defenceman scored a pair, and Adams, Presswood and Robinson counted singles for Georgetown. Acton scorers were Heller and Holmes.

Milton 5 - Fergus 3
Despite a five goal output by Milton sniper Bruce McBuff, Milton used their superior balance to bounce Fergus 5-3 in their first round. McBuff got support from Christensen, Kuebel and Brush in the goal department, while Fergus tallies were scored by Selby (2), Turner, Patrick and Meier.

The 1,131 paying customers who jammed the Memorial arena Friday night saw Milton's hockey hopes take a nose dive, as Raiders displayed their old class to whom the green-shirts 0-3 and move into a 3 to 1 edge in games in their best of 7 OHA elimination.

The Raiders copped their second game, a key one, at Milton last Wednesday night, 6 to 5.

Friday's contest contrasted Wednesday's win in that the locals took it easy on the ordinary cases by grabbing a commanding lead early and then staying out of trouble. It was 3-0 at the first period, 7-1 after two Raiders kept the heat on in the third to out score Milton 2-1. But the final total could easily have gone into two figures.

Two injuries marred the win. At 9:34 of the second big Dave Voyce caught Ed Haslett with a shoulder as the flashy Milton rear-guard raced down the right side, and as the third period ended, Merchant Jack Price brought a knee up into Gerry Inglis' thigh as they went into the boards at the west end. Both players had to be carried off.

The Haslett incident cost Voyce a questionable five minute charging penalty that even drew doubting comment from some Milton backers. Voyce served up a hard but clean shoulder that dumped Haslett to the ice and his momentum carried him into the boards. He tried to get up but fell back. Milton players were immediately around Voyce like terriers around a St. Bernard. Referee Hodgins assessed a major but the Merchants were not satisfied. Playing coach N. Dowdall posted himself just outside the referee's circle and threw taunts at the big defenceman until play resumed.

From there on out Milton's tactics were obvious and asinine. Voyce had hurt Haslett, and whether the play was clean or not, every red and white uniform became a target for Milton bodies. Cunningham, Varey, Richardson, Inglis, all absorbed the wrath of the victors in elbows and cross checks as Milton executed their absurd logic. Some kind of satisfaction was prob-

ably gained when Price felled Gerry Inglis in the dying seconds and Dixon, and at 9:23 Doug Richardson potted the third one from Jr. Beaumont and Blake Inglis.

Blake Inglis, Dixon, Densere and Thompson all counted in the middle period after Pullock had scored for the Merchants, and in the third it was much the same story. The Raiders dominated the play, allowing Milton one goal by Stu Mannant and answering a pair of the sticks of Doug Richardson and Junior Beaumont.
