

Sixth Happiness Lady to Speak at St. John's Church



GLADYS AYWARD, internationally known through filming of her life story as 'The Inn of the Sixth Happiness.' Miss Aylward will speak in St. John's United Church in town on March 27.

Gladys Aylward, who rose from the position of a London parlourmaid to become a legend in her own lifetime through heroic service in war ravaged China, will speak at St. John's United Church on Sunday, March 27th, at the 11 a.m. service of worship and also at the Sunday School at 9:45 a.m.

Miss Aylward, "The Small Woman" of the best seller under that title and whose story was condensed in the Reader's Digest and portrayed on the screen in "The Inn of the Sixth Happiness," is now on a speaking tour of Canada. She is the guest of World Vision, Inc., a service agency giving emergency aid to more than 75 million orphans in 100 countries.

She dreamed of going to China as a missionary, but was unable to obtain backing because of her lack of education. So she determined to go anyway without help from anyone.

In 1930, equipped with railroad tickets, her Bible, nineteen cents in coins and two one-pound traveller's cheques, Gladys Aylward travelled across "impossible" Siberia.

Her life in a remote mountain town of northwest China be-

came a series of dramatic events. She stopped a prison riot alone by calmly facing an awaiting inmate, rescued a child from a slave-dealer, led the district's exalted Mandarin to accept Christianity. When war with Japan broke out, her danger increased, for loyalty to Nationalist China caused her to spy on the invaders. She was cruelly beaten. Then, as a fugitive without money or food, she led 100 homeless children to safety in the epic journey across wild mountains which has been chronicled in both her biography and the Hollywood film.

Illness forced her return to England for a time after more than 20 years service in China, but now she has returned to Formosa for more work among the Nationalist Chinese. The 140 children in an orphanage she directs there are among the more than 13,000 supported through World Vision. "We are honoured," says Dr. Bob Pierce, President of World Vision, "to have this part in the work of 'The Small Woman' and we are glad to make her available to the churches of Canada as part of our organization's ministry of missionary challenge."

Came From Italy To Wed. Mrs. Lorusso Dies

Friends and neighbours of the College View area mourn with the family in the loss of a friend and neighbour with the death of Mrs. Maria Masi Lorusso who died on March 8th at her home on Victoria Street.

Mrs. Lorusso was the daughter of the late Francesco and Lucia Masi and was born in Florence, Italy, in 1892. She came to Canada at the age of 19 in 1911 and married Emmanuel Lorusso on April 27, 1911. She was a member of Holy Cross Roman Catholic Church.

Mr. Lorusso survives his wife as do nine of their children. Frank of Magnetawan; Rocco, Georgetown; Annie (Mrs. A. McConkey) Ottawa; Rose (Mrs. A. Jacklin) Toronto; Dominic, Georgetown; Josie (Mrs. A. Hives) Mount Dennis; Michael, Joseph and Donald of Georgetown. Twenty-two grandchildren and three great grandchildren are also left. One daughter, their first child, died at the age of seven months.

Father Thomas Van Larr sang requiem mass on Tuesday morning, March 8th. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Richard Licato, James Murphy, Sidney Hulme, Earl Wilcox, all of Georgetown and two great nephews, Danny and Michael Lorusso of Willowdale. Several nieces, nephews and grandchildren attended the funeral from out of town.

Plan Local Red Cross Blitz For April 7th

In 1916 The Canadian Red Cross Society was founded as an affiliated body of the British Red Cross Society. By an Act of Parliament in 1920, The Canadian Red Cross Society received its Charter and in 1919 Ontario Division, with the approval of a system of Provincial Divisions, was organized.

The Georgetown Branch of the Red Cross received its Charter in 1920 and maintained an admirable record throughout the Second World War. After the war, the local Branch became much busier with the resumption of war, the loss of equipment which continued to function as needed.

To many, Red Cross exists solely in time of war, but the purposes of the Society as set forth by its Charter are brief:

"To furnish voluntary aid to the sick and wounded during time of war, to succour them with the Treaty of Geneva."

"In time of peace or war, to carry on and extend its work for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease, and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world."

For the funds required to finance all of the various undertakings of the Red Cross there is no source except the amounts obtained by the branches through public subscriptions and an annual appeal for public funds is undertaken on a national scale during the month of March.

The Campaign Committee of the Georgetown Branch is under the chairmanship of Jack Spence and the Campaign Blitz Night has been set for Thursday, April 7th, when canvassers will call throughout the residential sections of Georgetown and district.

Supported by a highly trained establishment of social nursing, technical and administrative personnel, it is estimated that volunteers perform 97% of Red Cross work in Canada. The duties of these volunteers and the extensive programmes carried on by the Canadian Red Cross will be outlined in an article next week.

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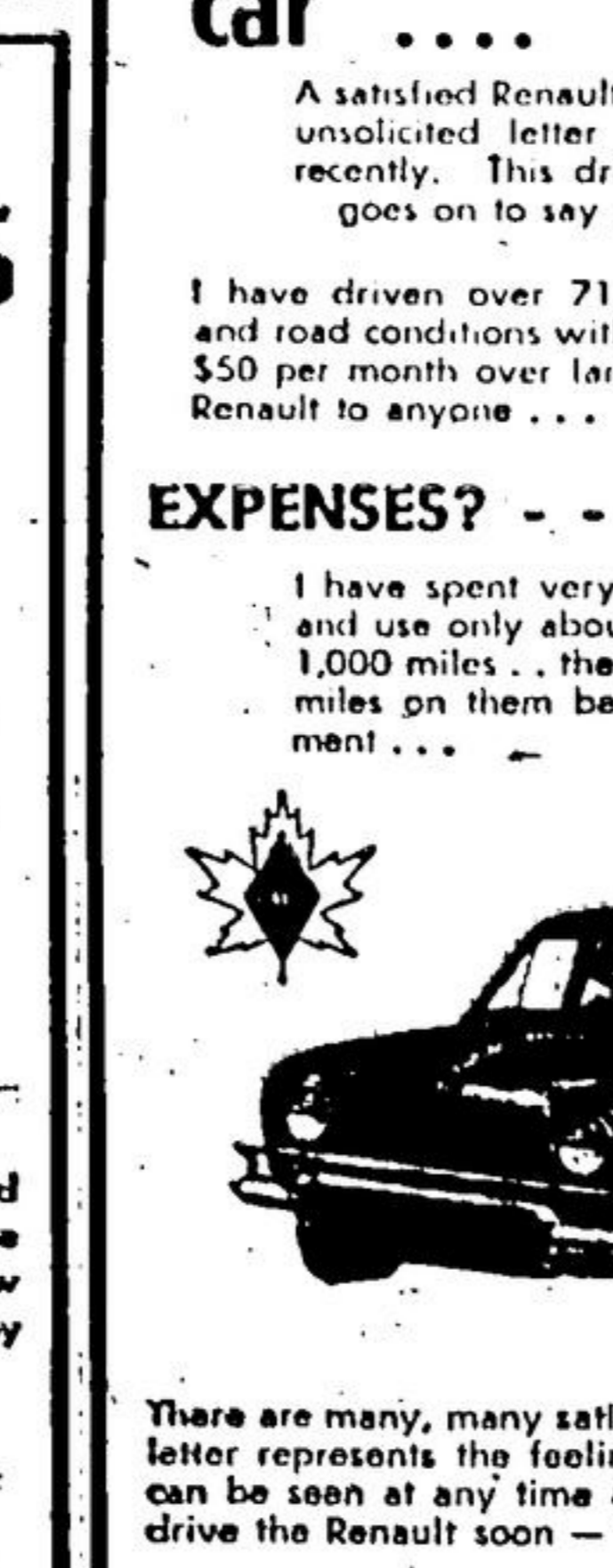
